Handball history was made in 1881 when the champions of five nations, including Ireland, took part in the first-ever officially sponsored World Handball championship which was ataged in New York from 5th October to 19th October, inclusive. On the home front further progress can be reported although therestill remains a vart amount of work to be done in all spheres before we can feel happy with the position at all levels.

Handball in Meath continues to grow in popularity. A total of six clubs affiliated, which is a big improvement on previous years. Dublin continues to go from strength to strength with sompetitions at all levels from Senior to Juvenile. The use of Croke Park so generously given by the G.A.A. County Committee is an example that could well be followed by many other counties. Carlow and Longford are still weak links in the Province, and again I appeal to the respective G.A.A. County Committees to accept the responsibility that is theirs to foster sill Gaelic games and not, just the field games. Despite their many successes in the Senior championships, I regret to say that handball enthusiasm in Louth is not what one would expect from a county with such a great tradition for the game. Wexford, the strongest county in the Province, has ample scope to extend further their activities, especially at juvenile level. The same remark applies to Kilkenny, one of the best equipped counties in the county. Wicklow, despite the distance between the various clubs, operates a full programme of championship and league competitions at all levels from Senior to Juvenile and set an example for some of the bester equipped counties, weather their activities especially at juvenile level. the Officers of the Laois G.A.A. County Committee to make an effort to get bandball established in the county. They are more fortunate than some counties as they have alleys available.

Kerry, who now stand 3rd in the All-Ireland honours list, have made no worthwhile progress over the past number of years. Only three clubs are affiliated and they are in the vicinity of Tralee. Surely such a county with such a fine tradition for Gaelic gameo cannot feel happy with this position. Handball in Cork continues to improve each year and the progress made over the past two years should set an example to the other Munster counties. Handball in Waterford and Clare is badly in need of rejuvenation and I appeal to the respective G.A.A. County Committees to face up to their responsibilities. Tipperary, with its many clubs could, I feel, do with internal re-organisation as it is almost impossible to get any details of their activities. Handball in Limerick is definitely on the upgrade and I look forward with confidence to the future.

With the exception of Leitrim handball is really thriving in all the Connacht counties. Club affiliations in Roscommon showed a good increase and the county appears well organised with clubt in most areas. Mayo still remains a very active and well organised county, despite the constant drain of emigration Galway deserve to be specially commended for their progress when you consider that they have received no financial assistance for the past new years. Surely the G.A.A. County Committee cannot feel happy that they sre playing their part in fostering the game when this position exists. Plans are well under way to have the Hallymote court roofed eerly this year, thus giving Sligo and Connacht its first roofed court. This will be a great boom to handball in the West as the inclement weather if recent years has caused many postponements. While I appreciate the problems that exist in Leitrim nevertheless. I feel that it should be possible to promote handball in most areas as a handball club can be organized with the minimum of members.

The new alley erected at Falcairagh is indeed a welcome addition and should give handball an added boost in Donegal. It is regrettable that neither Derry or Down have any handball clubs. Again I appeal to the respective GAA County Committees to realize that they have a definite responsibility to foster handball, and until such time as they accept this responsibility they cannot feel that they are fulfilling their obligations to the Association. While Antrim and Fermanach are both affiliated, I feel the position of handball in both of these counties could show a big improvement if they made an intensive drive to promote the game in the schools and at juvenile level. Handball in Monaghan continues to deteriorate and unless the position is taken in hand immediately I can see the game becoming extinct in a very short time. Caven with clubs in most districts is wall organised and esta headline for the other Ulster counties. Tyrone continues to make progress and I look forword to the election of more alleys in the county. Armagh is fortunate in having the three fine alleys at Lurgan at their disposal. For a county with no great tradition they are making slow but steady progress.

The Gael-Linn competition continues to grow in popularity from year to year. ...is year a record total of 1,088 players entered for the current competition. Leinster with a total of 552 players make up more than half the entries. Comment entries of 200 is an increase over last year while Munster with 176 players also show an increase. WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP.

The first-ever official World Handball Championship was hold in the New Yord Athletic Club from 5th October to 10th October, 1984, Inclusive. The purpose of the championship—first to recognise and honour the World's Handball champions in both singles and doubles; accord and of equal importance the promotion and development of handball on an International basis. As this championship was run on the Round Robin system it enabled representatives of each country to meet in either singles or doubles. A total of five nations competed—U.S.A. Canada, Mexico, Australia and Ireland. It was the desire of the organizing committees that the players from the different countries would get to know each other—discuss rules and playing regulations—handball alleys and style of play—for the purpose of stendardining the name through the creation of an International Handball Federation. Keen rivalry existed and all games were close and hard fought. The standard of sportsmanship displayed by all contestants was one of the highlights of the championship. The organising committee especially the Chairman, Mr. Charles O'Connell, is to be complimented on the very efficient manner in which they carried out the arrangements. The hospitality at the New York Athletic Club surpassed all expectations.

Remember we entered this championship without any prior knowledge of the various rules and regulations and absolutely no experience of the small 40 by 20 American courts or the intense heat of the New York courts. I can assure you that they added considerably to the prestige of Irish Handball. In fact had Joe Maher the benefit of a week's training in America and hed he not to play singles and doubles. I feel confident that he would have at least finished runner-up in the singles. As it was he was only defeated by 2 games to 1 game by both Mexico and Canada, two countries which play to the same rules as the Americans. A win in both of these matches would have ensured him of being runner-up. So impressive was the performance of our representatives, especially Joe Maher, that before we left for home both America and Canada approached

formance of our representatives, especially Joe Maher, that before we left for home both America and Canada approached him to return for good.

The next World Handball Championship is provisionally arranged for Toronto in 1957. However, if we are to compete in future championships we must send three representatives—one for singles and two for doubles—as it is most unreasonable to expect a player to play both singles and doubles on the same night in a championship of this nature. In the recent championship each country had selected separate representatives for both singles and doubles. We must also make every effort to have at least two or more small 40 by 20 courts built to give our representatives ample opportunity to become familior with them before their departure.

(2) Refereeing is exceptionally strict with no foul play of any nature tolerated.

- (3) The main difference in our rules and the International rules as adopted by the other countries come under the following headings:
 - (A) Kicking is not allowed. Penalty, hand out or ace as appropriate.

 (B) Players guilty of weiting the ball—penalty, forfeiture of service.

 (C) Short balls are not playable.

- (E) Players must wear their singlet for the full rubber.

 (F) In doubles the order of service must be followed for each game—penalty, hand out.

(G) A player is not allowed run in over short line to take a served hall.

(H) Covering is not allowed.

(I) All matches are the best of a rubber of three games

Thanks to his foresignt, the Gael-Linn competition has now reached record proportions, as it was on his original suggestion that the competition was first started. We wish him many years of fruitful work in his high office.

almost all parts of the country. While success was never his in the All-Ireland Championships, I feel that he would have certainly won at least one Junior All-Ireland had he not opted to go Senker. He had the unique distinction of being one of the first trishmen ever to compete in an official World Championship.

The departure of Joe Maher for Canada certainly means a big loss to Irish handball. Holder of three National titles, in addition to the Gael-Linn trophy, he gave generously of his services in the promotion of the game. Apart from competing in the championships, he was ever ready to take part in club tournaments or exhibition games, no matter where they were staged. I doubt if any player over the years has helped so much in this respect. It is only fitting that we should wish him well in his new life.

"One wonders if our influence on the sporting and social fronts of the larger urban, and especially the newly-built areas where no tradition exists, is as strong as we would like it to be. If we agree that there is much room for a more dynamic appreach on our part, then surely we should make a determined effort to provide for the special needs which face these areas. The good-will and support of many of the residents in these districts can be relied upon—it rests with us to set the process in motion and to provide the initial impetus to these people who have no ady forum, no chibbouse or historical binding-force such as ifd be applicable to similar areas in a rural environment.

"In these times of rapid change and social flux, problems such as these will face us more frequently than in the past. Not alone must we be conscious of the speed and violence of our time, but we must be willing to prove that we are flexible enough to adapt our organisation to changing circumstances. If we fail to see these changes in time we may find ourselves attempting to discover remedies for an incurable disease. There are good reasons for thinking that the efforts we will have to put into maintaining our position of prominence in the future may need to be much more energetic than in the past. I would offier the following suggestions for your consideration with a view to consolidating the ground already gained over the past forty years and in an effort to develop further the fine National sport of handball:

- (1) Develop handball as the indoor game of the G.A.A. with special emphasis on roofing and lighting. A roofed alley could make a big impact on the social life of the community. It could be utilised to develop a Gaelic social unit in the parish. This is one aspect which the G.A.A. to a large extent has been lacking.
- That an effort be made to reduce the spreadover of our championships. At present they commence at the beginning of April and continue until the middle of October or later. If this could be achieved, it would leave more time for other competitions. We must provide more competition for all our players and not just ton-class phayers. top-class pinyers
- Explore the possibility of staging programmes at night under lights. This would eliminate the unsvoidable clashing with hurling and football matches.
- classing with hirring and rootball matches.

 That an all-out drive be made to develop handball on a widespread basis at juvenile, school, and college level. This is one of the most important aspects of our work that has not received anything like the necessary attention over the years. The youth are really the lifeblood of the Council, and unless we are prepared to give them our special attention we are only building our foundations in shifting sand.
- In addition to the standard three and four-wall handball, the Armericans have now introduced one-wall handball with separate rules. This type of court is found mostly in public parks or clubs. Would this form of handball

be an asset in Ireland? While it will never replace the traditional four-wall handball, I feel its introduction could help to develop further the interest in handball. The specifications are: (a)—Front wall, 16 feet high and 20 feet wide: (b)—floor, 30 feet long and 20 feet wide. It is very suitable for the many youth clubs and colleges, as the playing area can also be used for other sports when not required for handball.

Are we satisfied with the position of hardball? It is almost impossible to get balls desplie the many approaches made over the years. Skins are also very difficult to obtain. Again, do all counties sponsor county championships in hardball?

RAFFLE:

The profit on the raffle showed a good increase over the past two years. Council are indebted to the many officials and players who helped to make it such a success. However, there are still counties who are not pulling their weight. As a result of the efforts of the past three years, it was possible to meet the expenses of the representatives who travelled to the World Championship and also to set aside a grant of £200 to be paid to Ballymace when they commence work on roofing their court. Once again I appeal to all sounties to support the forthcoming raffle. If each county was to sell 200 books of tickets, it would enable the Council to give a yearly grant towards roofing a court in addition to setting aside money to meet future World Championship commitments.

FINANCE:

Council are indebted to the G.A.A. Central Council and its officers for the very generous manner in which they met us this pear. They increased the annual grant from £500 to £500 and gave a special grant of £300 to clear portion of the Bank Overdraft on the No. 1 Account. In addition, they gave a special grant of £200 to meet part of the expenses of the representatives travelling to the World Championship. Even allowing for the generous treatment, we are in debt at the end of the year to the extent of £500 approximately. Making a survey of the line extent of £500 approximately. Making a survey of the line exam budget on an annual income of approximately £750, while expenses will be approximately £000. This leaves an estimated deficil of £250 per year to be met. How are we to ower come this defect? Teams' expenses take the major portion of monies available and unless we can find some way to reduce them the position will become impossible in a short time. To make a comparison—teams through gate receipts bring approximately £500 in travelling and hotel expenses. In fact, this figure would be much higher were it not for the very generous ro-operation of some members who use their own cars. Take the position of the average footballer and hurler, who oring in through gate receipts sufficient money to finance the whole Association, and yet they only receive the same allowance as our players.

AUDITORS' REPORT

The President and Members of: Irish Amateur Handball Association, Gaelic Athletic Association, per Seosamh uasal O Loinghsigh, Honorary Secretary.

A Chairde.

We have audited the Books of the Association for the year ended 31st December, 1964. We enclose General Income and Expenditure Account, Gael-Linn Account and International and Tournament Account, together with Balance Sheet showing the financial position of the Association at 31st December, 1964.

GENERAL INCOME AND EXPENDITURE ACCOUNT

Income of the year consisting of Affiliation Fees, £14 10s.; Gate Receipts, £181 2s. 4d.; Grant from Central Council, £600; Special Grant from Central Council to reduce Bank Overdraft, £300, and Sales of Handballs and Rule Books, £7 3s. 6d. came to £1,103 1s. 10d. Expenditure came to £1,023 12s. 6d. Income exceeded Expenditure by £73 9s. 4d.

As compared with the preceding year when Expenditure (to the nearest pound) exceeded Income by £357. Income increased by £421 and Expenditure increased by £91. The increase in Income was due to an increase of £29 in Gate Receipts; an increase of £100 in the Annual Grant from Central Council and the receipt of a Special Grant, £300, from Central Council which had no equivalent in 1963. Sales of Handballs Geereased by £5. On the Expenditure side, Teams' Expenses Increased by £35; Medals increased by £10, and Printing and Stationery increased by £14.

GAEL-LINN-INCOME AND EXPENDITURE ACCOUNT.

Expenditure of the year, including Players' Expenses, £186 3s. 9d., came to £281 13s. 2d. Gate Receipts amounted to £53 13s. 2d. The Excess of Expenditure over Income, viz., £228, was met by a grant received from Gael-Linn.

INTERNATIONAL AND TOURNAMENT—INCOME AND EXPENDITURE ACCOUNT

Income of the year comprising Gate Receipts, £13 2s. 6d.; Members Subscriptions, £71 18s. 1d.; Special Grant from Central Council for World Championships, £200; Grant from Ciste na Banban, £50, and gross receipts from Raffle £182 12s. 3d., amounted to £517 12s. 10d. Expenditure, including expenses of Raffle, came to £421 4s. 6d. Income exceeded Expenditure by £96 8s. 4d.

As compared with the preceding year, when Income exceeded Expenditure by £150 0s. 2d., Income increased by £317 17s. 7d. and Expenditure increased by £371 9s. 5d.; Members' Subscriptions increased by £26; the gross Proceeds of Raffle increased by £23, and there was no income in 1963 to correspond with Gate Receipts, £13; Special Grant from Central Council, £200, and Grant from Ciste na Banban £50, in the year under review. On the Expenditure side there were no expenses in 1963 to correspond with Teams' Expenses, £12, and Travelling and Hotel Expenses re World Championships at New York, £351 in 1964.

BALANCE SHEET.

The Assets of the Association at 31st December, 1264, amounted to £203 (s. 3d. Liabilities at the same date came to £404 is. 3d. Liabilities exceeded Assets by £201 is. 5d. No value was placed on Cups and Trophies which are set out for record purposes only on the face of the Balance Sheet.

As usual, the Books were presented in good order for audit and vouching was satisfactory.
