

### STANDING ORDERS

- (1) The proposer of a Motion or an Amendment may speak for not more than five minutes when making the proposal. He may speak a second time for not more than three minutes before a vote is taken.
- (2) A delegate seconding or speaking to a Motion or an Amendment may speak once only and must not exceed three minutes.
- (3) The President may at any time he considers a matter has been sufficiently discussed call on the proposer for a reply, and when that has been given a vote must be taken.
- (4) A delegate may, with the consent of the President, move "that the question be put" after which, when the porposer has spoken a vote must be taken.
- (5) Standing Orders shall not be suspended for the purpose of considering any matter not on the Agenda except by the consent of the majority equal to two-thirds of those present and voting.

## TUARASCÁIL AN RIARTHÓRA

Tá géarghá le mionscrúdú a dhéanamh ar chlár na gcómortas Tá an méid sin comórtas ann anois go bhfuil freastal a dhéanamh faoi dhó agus faoi thrí ar imreoirí áirithe. Níos measa fós, ní am ann a thuilleadh dona hilchomórtais chlubanna a bhiódh chomh coitianta.

Cúis mhór imní cás na liathróid láimhe i mBaile Átha Cliath. Tá milliún daoine ina gcónaí sa chontae agus gan teagmháil ach ag an-bheagán leis an gcluiche. Ní caint ach gníomh atá ag teastáil le go n-aithbheofaí an liathróid láimhe.

Cé gur chinneadh gan foireann oifigiúil a chur chuig Chomórtais na Sóisear sna Stáit Aontaithe um Nollaig, d'imir beirt faoi 19 ann, Peadar Mac Amhalaí agus Uaitéar O Conchúir. Shroich an bheirt acu an Chroabh agus d'érigh le Uaitéar an teideal a chain sé anuraidh a bhreith leis arís tar éis trí dhianchluiche, Léiríonn sé seo ardchaighdéan na liathróid láimhe i measc na n-aosánach anseo in Eireann.

"hile the past year has been successful in a number of ways this is no reason for complacency and putting a number of aims and objectives on the back burner. It is an accepted fact that we have made tremendous strides in the field of court construction but nevertheless we have not capitalised on this great growth. The position as I see it is that we must develop a fast track plan that will increase considerably the level of participation and thus ensure that the vast sums of money spent on court construction throughout the country is fully justified.

While we did not send an official team to the U.S. Junior Championships in December two of our players, Peter McAuley and Walter O'Connor travelled to compete in the under 19 Championships and both qualified for the final with Walter retaining his title in a very closely contested final which went to a tie-breaker. This is the second consecutive year for two Irish players to meet in this final and is further evidence of the strength of Irish handball at underage level.

On the home front all our championships and competitions were carried out successfully. However, the introduction of the extra grades in the Masters category created problems as we had players king part in as many as four championships in the same code. The time has come when we must take a hard look at our whole competition structure and come up with realistic and practical proposals that will allow counties more time to run off their championships and clubs more free time to run tournaments. A glut of competitions at national and provincial level can cause stagnation at club level.

The serious position of handball in Dublin was discussed at a Special meeting but as no positive proposals were forthcoming it was agreed to call another special meeting early in the year involving the Dublin G.A.A. and Handball County Committee and the Leinster G.A.A. and Handball Provincial Councils. While the demolition of the old court at Croke Park will pose problems in the short term I am convinced that the G.A.A. decision to replace it with a new court will improve the image of Dublin Handball. However this in itself is not sufficient to improve the overall position. Every effort must be made to increase participation in the areas where courts already exist by launching an all embracing promotional programme.

Other initiatives worthy of consideration are:

- (A) Approaches should be made to all G.A.A. Clubs and Community groups to build handball courts. This is especially applicable where Sports Centres already exist or where clubs are embarking on development projects.
- (B) Revitalise handball at both Primary and Post Primary level.

(C) Introduce an "Action Handball" promotion consisting of mini-handball games in the Inner City area. We now have promotional material available for use in areas of this nature. I feel, that if approached, the Dublin Corporation Community and Recreation Officers would help out in this regard. The Dublin V.E.C. Sports Advisory Committee is another body that could provide help.

On the question of future development I feel we would set a maximum of three reasonable attainable objectives as without a planned approach we are going nowhere.

Sport has now developed into a Leisure Industry with the level of participation in most sports increasing all the time, therefore if we are to be successful we must adopt a professional approach in all our promotional operations.

### Court Construction

A number of clubs have embarked on court construction projects without any proper planning and as a result some find themselves in trouble financially and otherwise. Before starting any projects clubs should have a well worked out financial plan as lack of finance can cause major problems to clubs. Once the court is built there is the problem of management and this again is something that must be planned in advance. On the question of funds consideration should be given to approaching employees of local firms and ask that they agree to having a weekly deduction made from their wages for club funds and this money could be used to build or renovate courts or cover employees membership fee. This approach has been tried in a number of areas and proved very effective.

### Handball and the Community

When one talks about the promotion of handball in the community one is basically talking about the various categories of people that go to make up the community. In this report it is my intention to deal only with selected areas where I think we can make a significant contribution.

(A) Unfortunately a large number of our community have enforced leisure time due to the high level of unemployment. While I accept that sport cannot offset unemployment nevertheless it should be seen as a means of using leisure time in a positive way.

As I see it we have a definite duty to create employment, even on a part-time basis in an effort to alleviate the position. I would appeal to clubs especially those with handball courts, to strongly consider employment even on a part-time basis as such a move would in my view lead to much more efficient management of our premises and could also lead to an increased level of participation.

On a second front we should be encouraging these people to become involved in handball as a form of recreation. This can be done by making our premises available especially in the off-peak hours for very nominal charges. Leadership is one of the vital elements to the development of any sport and I feel that there are a number of these people, with proper training, who could perform a very useful role for handball and at the same time feel that they are contributing in a positive way to overcome the many evils of our time. It is accepted that idle time creates problems and in my view extra policing is not the full answer and this is where sport comes in. When one considers that 1/3 of our population

will not find employment it emphasises strongly the urgency to change the school curriculum to ensure that sport is an essential part of it.

(B) There seems to be a lack of awareness for the needs and requirements of the Disabled. We all have a responsibility in this regard and we should ensure that they have equal opportunities of participation whether it be in the playing of handball or the administration of the Sport. There are many categories of disabled people and a considerable number of them actively participate in our game. The Roscrea club which is actively working with the local "Work Shop" sets an example of what can be done where goodwill exists.

### G.A.A. and Handball

Generally at County, Provincial and Central level handball receives very good support and we are very appreciative of their help and co-operation.

While there has been a sizeable increase in the number of G.A.A. clubs building handball courts there is still plenty of scope for further development in this area.

A problem, as I see it, with a number of football and hurling clubs is the failure to provide activity for members when their playing days are over, which is normally around 35 years of age or sometimes earlier. As handball is now a life long sport the provision of a handball court could be the solution to this problem. I would appeal to these clubs to give serious thought to this suggestion.

### All Ireland Championships

The decision of last years Annual Congress to introduce six additional championships into the softball code make it very difficult to complete our programme on schedule. There was considerable duplication in the overage bracket as certain players were eligible to compete in as many as six championships under the new rules. This position will become much worse in 1988 with these new championships being extended to the 40 x 20 code. Indeed were it not for the full co-operation of players and county officials our task would have been almost impossible.

While the Study Group set up to examine the full Championship structure met during the year they are not anywhere near the stage of finalising their recommendations and as a result the report will not now be available until well into the present year.

Our Senior Singles Championships were dominated by Michael Walsh of Kilkenny who retained his Coca-Cola Singles title for the third consecutive year and his namesake Michael Walsh of Roscommon who won both the 40 x 20 and Hardball titles to make a breakthrough at this level after a number of years of perseverance to achieve success in a premier championship. The Quish brothers retained the S.H.D. title for the fourth consecutive year but lost their Coca-Cola Doubles title to Michael Walsh and Eugene Downey of Kilkenny who were previous winners of this championship. The young Meath partnership of James McGovern and Tom Sheridan added to the county's long list of championship wins in various grades when winning the 40 x 20 Senior Doubles title and the 60 x 30 Junior Doubles title. In addition David Gough and Paul O'Rourke won the 40 x 20 M.D. and Egin Jensen the 60 x 30 J.S. P. McAuley of Louth emerged as the dominant figure in the Junior and Minor grades with a total of seven wins, three in 40 x 20, three in hardball, and one in softball. It was indeed a unique performance and augurs well for the future. F. McCann of Sligo, one of the most consistent players in the country earned his reward for perseverance when partnered by Simon Davey he won the J.H.D. in decisive fashion. Pierce O'Keefe, son of the renowned Paddy, won the 60 x 30 and Under 21 D and also the 40 x 20 Under 21 Doubles, his partner being P. Maher. A further success for Kilkenny was the win of Anthony Greene in the Masters Softball S. Limerick Minors Paul Gavin and Kieran Lyons in winning the 60 x 30 M.D. brought the county its first title in this grade since 1957. John Donnellan of Clare won three Novice titles, 40 x 20 Singles and Doubles and the 60 x 30 Doubles, with T. Maloney and N. Breen proving very capable partners with double successes.

Further honours came to Clare when John Kirby won both Masters Doubles titles partnering brother Dan in 40 x 20 and Mick Hogan in 60 x 30 Championships. Tipperary had to settle for only one success, with Eddie Corbett winning the 40 x 20 Under 21S title. Billy Kerins was once again to the forefront in the Golden Masters grade in winning three of the four titles in 60 x 30 and 40 x 20 codes. His brother Tommy partnered him once again in the Doubles. Joey Maher of Louth added to his long list of titles when he retained his G.M.S. championship. Dick Lyng, a former Senior champion won the 40 x 20 Masters Singles for the first time and further success came the county's way with Tony Breen winning the 60 x 30 Novice Singles. Dublin had a dual success with R. Walsh winning the Silver Masters Softball Singles and P. Ryan and E. Flynn the Masters D., Division II. Another great campaigner Tom Derrig of Mayo had a well deserved success in winning the Masters Singles, Division II. Wicklow's Michael Dyer and Ray Aylward, former Masters Doubles champions became the first winners of the new Silver Masters, Division I, Doubles. Waterford, despite a lack of playing facilities, continue to figure in the honours list with D. Mulcahy winning the Silver Masters S. Division II. The success of Michael Naughton and Frank Kenny of Roscommon in the Silver Masters Doubles, Division II meant that for the first time, a G.A.A. Vice-Presdient in the person of Frank Kenny appears in the honours list.

### International

It was decided, in view of the forthcoming World Championships not to send an official team of underage players to the U.S.A. Junior Championships in December. However as a result of special government grants for outstanding Sports personalities it was possible for both Walter O'Connor of Meath and Peter McAuley of Louth to travel to compete in the 19 and Under Singles. It was a further tribute to Irish Junior Handball that the players concerned reached the final in this grade with Walter, the 1986 winner, retaining his title after a closely contested final that went to a tie breaker. Incidentially, this is the second consecutive year for two Irish players to meet in the final of this grade.

### All Ireland Juvenile Championships

Once again our juvenile championships, in both codes, were one of the highlights of the year and augurs well for the future of Irish Handball. Both the level of participation and the standard of play was indeed a great incentive to the many hard working officials who are committed to Juvenile promotion.

C. Curran of Tyrone the player responsible for bringing Ulster its two first Juvenile Singles titles in 1986 repeated the performance this year despite moving into a higher age bracket. M. Finnegan of Cavan won the Under 12 Singles championships in both codes thus ensuring that these two titles remained in Ulster for the second year. Clare again figured prominently winning both Under 12 Doubles titles with twins Declan and Liam Frawley. The Wicklow partnership of T. O'Donohoe and T. Sullivan have been there or thereabouts in the various under championships over the years and it was nice to see them

bringing off the double in the Under 16 60 x 30 and 40 x 20 championships. Offaly is another county that has made a breakthrough at this level in the past few years and it is encouraging to see the efforts being maintained with the success of C. O'Brien and B. Doherty in Under 13 60 x 30 Doubles and M. Blake and A. Doherty in under 15 40 x 20 Doubles. Kilkenny for so long the kingpins of juvenile handball had only a solitary success when D. Ftizgerald won the Under 13 40 x 20 Singles. Wexford, another county dominant in the early years of the juvenile championships have not been a force in recent years. However the success of N. McGrath and K. Cowman in the 40 x 20 Under 13 Doubles may be the incentive needed to revive the county's fortunes. Limerick maintained their high profile at this level in winning three titles with M. Crowe scoring in 60 x 30 Under 13 Singles and P. Murphy in 60 x 30 Under 15 Singles while J. McQuaid won the 40 x 20 Under 15 Singles. Dubliner A. Benson has been very prominent in the various age groups over the years and added to his successes when winning the 60 x 30 under 16 Singles. Mayo and Roscommon always to the fore in these championships once again figure in the honours list with C. Henegan and A. Cunningham winning the 60 x 30 under 14 Doubles for Roscommon and D. Fox and C. Judge (Mayo) winning the 40 x 20 under 14 Doubles. Tipperary had a double success at this level with M. McInerney winning the 40 x 20 under 16 Singles and D. Maloney and M. Murphy winning through in 60 x 30 under 16 Doubles.

### National League

A total of 17 teams competed in the 40 x 20 League which produced a number of keenly contested matches. A welcome addition was the Longford team competing for the first time in a national team competition. While they were unsuccesful they performed creditably in all matches and are to be complimented on the presentation of the teams for each match. Clare, a county that has figured prominently in this competition over the years were the outright winners with decisive wins in the semi-final against Kilkenny and Dublin in the final. The 60 x 30 League was a non-event as sufficient entries were not received to enable arrangements to proceed. The glut of national and provincial competitions now available, is imposing a very severe strain on both County Committees and Provincial Councils and it is understandable that counties are not prepared to take on additional competitions. Having discussed this problem with a number of counties I found that they are having difficulty in getting all their county championships completed within the year and further the view has been expressed that there is little or no time left for club tournaments which in the past were the life blood of the club.

### Inter-Club Championships

As in former years there was considerable interest in both codes with keen competition throughout. Templeudigan, a club that has only roofed its court in the past year, was amply rewarded for its efforts to provide better facilities, when winning the Corn Gael Linn for the Novice 60 x 30 championship. In winning the Junior 60 x 30 title the Mullinavat club made a bit of history in this grade with father and son, Paddy and Pierce O'Keeffe, playing on the winning team. Claremorris, one of the pioneers of 40 x 30 handball in Connacht, gained a noteable success when winning the 40 x 20 Novice title. Dunshaughlin a club always prominent in various grades of competition were put to the pin of their collar to win the Junior title by three aces in a thrilling game against Fermoy.

### Feile na nGael

The competitions which were held in Clare for the second year in succession proved an outsanding success. The number of teams competing showed a further increase and all the participating counties are to be complimented on the attire of their players.

Without doubt this year was the best organised Feile and even surpassed that of last year which was commented on very favourably by the participating counties. The local committee led by the dynamic Michael O'Hanlon is well deserving of our very sincere thanks for a job exceptionally well done. Certainly Clare has set an example to all other counties for the future.

### Comhairle na nBan

In my report last year I commented on the success of the Ladies in the World Championships and felt confident at that time that this would be the springboard from which to launch a major promotional drive. However for one reason or another this has not materialised and as a result there was no significant improvement during the past year.

I believe the day has now been reached when we must carry out an indepth analysis of the whole situation as it exists at present, and if we are serious about involving ladies in handball then we must come up with a feasible promotional plan which will be backed by all our units.

### Primary Schools

Promotional material on Mini-handball was distributed to all Schools throughout the country during the past year and in a number of cases there has been a very favourable response. If we are to capitalise on this costly promotional drive we must sit down and plan an effective promotional campaign that will involve both teachers and students. I would see a series of coaching and promotional courses being organised for teachers with a very special emphasis on the Teacher Training Colleges.

### Post-Primary Schools

There is still a lack of commitment on the part of our clubs to become involved in promoting handball at this level. One of the major obstacles to development of handball is the lack of committed teachers and leaders in most of the colleges. Since most of these colleges are non-residential it should make it all the easier for our clubs to make contact with the majority of students and welcome them to use the club facilities. The merging of Secondary Schools and the V.E.C. into one unit for football and hurling is something that should be carried through to handball with beneficial results to the overall increase of interest.

### Higher Education

The lack of facilities at Thomond College is something that is still with us despite promise after promise over the years. The extra funding granted recently to the college plus the money already on hand should be the initiative needed to at least get the construction of the handball courts underway.

Apart from the Universities the lack of court facilities at our Third level colleges is a big deterrent to overall development in this area.

### Court Grants

It is pleasing to report that there is no slowing down in the field of court construction and as a result the community in most counties are now well provided for. Grants we allocated during the year are as follows:

### Leadership

The second Leadership Course was held in Monaghan late in the year and there was a good attendance. The course was again conducted by T. Breathnach and C. O Corra and they are deserving of our thanks for both the preparation and the conducting of the course.

Looking to the future I am convinced that courses of this nature are a vital element if sport is to make major inroads into the Community. It should be possible for each Provincial Council to organise at least one course of this nature during the present year.

### Coaching

It was decided to drop the National Coaching Course for 1987 and in its place hold a series of three weekend courses which would enable a greater number of people to attend. However, despite this new initiative there was no dramatic improvement as some counties and provincial councils still don't seem to appreciate the value or need for coaching.

As ususal a number of courses were held at County and Provincial level and in general these were well supported. Teachers courses were held in St. Patrick's College, Dublin, Wexford and Kilkenny.

introduction of Mini-handball game has been very well received by the teachers and when introduced at the Mini Sports Festival proved very popular with all the participants taking part over the three days.

### Government Grants

Due to a decrease in funding at Cospoir level our Annual grant remained at the same level as at 1986. However now that the financial position has improved immensely as a result of the National Lottery I am confident that there will be a sizeable increase this year. In addition to the annual grant three players received Special grants under the Scheme for Outstanding Sports Personalities.

Our thanks is again due to the Department of Education and Cospoir for this annual grant as without this help handball would never have made such significant progress in recent years.

We are indeed indebted to the Ministr of State, Mr. Frank Fahy T.D., for his ever ready help and co-operation. The Chief Executive of Cospoir, Barra Uas O hUallacháin, and his assistant Con Haugh are once again deserving of our thanks for their ever ling help and advice at all times.

### R.T.E.

The finals of the World Handball Championships Trials were televised towards the end of the year and there was general agreement that this was a very good quality production. The exposure of handball on television has proved very popular in the past, especially the Top Ace Series, and has played a very significant role in the major upsurge of interest in the sport which in turn has brought about a massive growth in the field of court construction.

We are indebted to R.T.E. for this coverage and a special word of thanks is due to Fred Cogley, Tim O'Connor, Michael O'Carroll and Mick Dunne, for heir help and co-operation in ensuring that handball was covered in a very professional manner.

### Sponsorship

As in the past Coca-Cola was once again our major Sponsor. In addition to sponsoring the Senior Singles and Doubles Championships they also provided financial assistance to help in both the production of the Promotional Aids for schools and the televising of the finals of the international trials.

Our old friend Martin Flannery of Bohola, Co. Mayo, now living in the U.S.A. once again showed his commitment to Irish Handball by sending a sizeable subscription. In recent years he has been one of the most generous of our supporters and we are very much indebted to him for his support both moral and financial.

### Ceannáras Liathróid Láimhe

The major development programme at our Ceannáras is now completed and Irish handball has a very high quality Headquarters that compares more than favourable with any other sport.

During the past year approximately £23,000 was spent between improvements, repairs and maintenance. To date a sum in excess of £300,000 has been spent on the premises and while it has been possible to transfer all surplus income from Ceannáras to central funds this has gone nowhere near meeting these costs. It must be emphasised here that Ceannáras is the joint property of Cumann Luthchleas Gael Teo. and Comhairle Liathróid Láimhe na hÉireann and not any group of members and the function of the Management Committee is mainly the day to day running of the Centre and the final authority on all matters rests with Cumann Lúthchleas Gael and Comhairle Liathróid Láimhe na hÉireann.

In view of the condensation problem on the occasion of the All Ireland 60 x 30 Finals it is absoutely necessary to find a suitable system that will eliminate this problem for the future. While this may be a costly exercise nevertheless it is vital if we are not to have a recurrence sometime in the future.

Again it is my duty to pay tribute to our Caretaker Risteard Mac Maoileáin and our Bar Manager Michéal Ó Treasaigh for the very capable and efficient manner in which they carry out their dutues. Irín Uí Chollata continues to act as Rúnaí and carries out her duties in her own effective way in addition to her many responsibilities in handball administration.

### World Handball Championships

### Publicity

Generally the media coverage at national and provincial level has been in the main very positive in the treatment of our activities and are deserving of our thanks. It is obvious that our present serious financial situation cannot be allowed to continue and we must immediately set about organising ways and means to show a steady improvement each year as otherwise we will reach an irretrieveable position which will have a very serious affect not alone on handball development but on the overall position.

A special word of thanks is due to our Sub-Committees, our many committed officials and players which helped considerably in the smooth running of our total operation.
