

STANDING ORDERS

- (1) The proposer of a Motion or an Amendment may speak for not more than five minutes when making the proposal. He may speak a second time for not more than three minutes before a vote is taken.
- (2) A delegate seconding or speaking to a Motion or an Amendment may speak once only and must not exceed three minutes.
- (3) The Uachtarán may, at any time he considers a matter has been sufficiently discussed, call on the proposer for a reply, and when that has been given a vote must be taken.
- (4) A delegate may, with the consent of the Uachtarán, move "that the question be put" after which, when the proposer has spoken, a vote must be taken.
- (5) Standing Orders shall not be suspended for the purpose of considering any matter not on the Agenda except by the consent of the majority equal to two-thirds of those present and voting.

AG FÉACHAINT SIAR

Bhí bliain ana ghnóthach ag Comhairle Liathróid Láimhe na hÉireann i 1995 agus is féidir linn bheith dóchasach faoin cluiche agus faoin eagraíocht i gcotinne. Tá alán daoine ag obair chun liathróid láimhe a fhorbairt timpeall na tíre. Tá structúr réasúnta maith ag gach leibhéal agus tá daoine níos dóchasaí ná mar a bhí le blianta gur féidir an clúiche a leathnú in Éirinn agus san Eoraip.

Some of the year's highlights were

- * the introduction of the Waterford Crystal Irish Nationals
- ★ the inaugural Waterford Crystal-Gael Sport Handball Awards
- * the successful organisation of Féile na nGael in Limerick
- ★ the further delvelopment of international handball in European countries
- ★ the success of the Irish youth team in the U.S.H.A. Junior championships
- * improvements by counties in the presentation of their teams
- ★ positive developments with Cumann Lúthchleas Gael and Coiste Liathroid Láimhe Átha Cliath

Some points to be noted on the negative side were

- * the indiscipline of a small number of players
- ★ the lack of juvenile development in many counties
- * the relatively small return from the Rathcairn draw
- * the poor response to coaching courses which were offered
- ★ the cancellation of the 60 x30 National League due to the small number of entries

the low level of attendances at some of our finals

The doubling in the number of national competitions since 1986 has



meant that a lot more time and resources must be devoted to the organisation of fixtures. This means there is less emphasis than before on coaching and development, a situation which must be rectified. The Fixtures Review Committee has addressed this matter and some of its recommendations have been incorporated in the fixtures programme for 1996. We must press ahead and further streamline our fixtures: otherwise handball will decline seriously to a point where the overage championships will dominate the game in general and juvenile and youth handbal will be neglected.

ALL-IRELAND CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 56 All-Ireland Championships were shared by 17 counties. Seven of the ten counties which won Softball titles also took 40 x 20 awards with an additional seven counties joining the 40 x 20 honours list.

Kilkenny led the field winning a total of 9 All-Irelands, 7 of these in Softball. Michael 'Duxie' Walsh won an eleventh successive Senior Softball Singles title defeating Walter O'Connor, An Mhi, in a disappointing final on a 21-5, 21-5

scoreline. 'Duxie' teamed up with Eugene Downey to win their eighth Senior Softball Doubles title, another national record.

The Junior Softball Singles title was won by Nickey O'Reilly from the O'Loughlin's Club while his father Paddy won his third successive Silver Masters A Singles Softball title and teamed up with Seamus Reade to win the Doubles event. The evergreen Pat O'Keeffe from Mullinavat who holds over 20 All-Ireland titles won the Diamond Masters Singles event defeating 68-year-old former Waterford hurler Johnny Kiely in a well contested final. Kilkenny's other Softball title went to John Curran who defeated Antrim's Collie O'Hare 21-18, 21-14 in the Novice Singles final.

D.J. Carey partnered 'Duxie' Walsh to victory in the 40 x 20 Senior Doubles final over Antrim's Paddy Crothers and John McGarry 21-17, 21-17. Pat O'Keeffe also took a second title in 1995 partnering Eddie Leahy to victory over Waterford in the 40 x 20 Emerald Masters Doubles Championship.

SUCCESSES FOR CAVAN AND TIPPERARY

Cavan and Tipperary each won six All-Ireland titles. Michael Finnegan achieved a double double at U21 level with a comprehensive Softball Singles victory over Conor O'Brien of Offaly and a 21-18, 18-21, 21-8 win over Oliver Cassidy of Mayo in 40 x 20 and he partnered Raymond Cunningham and Dwayne Leggett respectively to victory over Offaly in both Softball and 40 x 20 Doubles. Cavan's other All-Ireland victories came in the 40 x 20 Masters B events with Dominic Sheridan defeating Tony Breen comprehensively in Singles and partnering Maurice Brady to defeat Tony Breen and Frank Hillis of Wexford 21-14, 21-12 to take the Doubles title.

Tipperary had five victories in the 60 x 30 court with Noel Murphy and Josie O'Dwyer showing the way in Intermediate Doubles defeating John Downey and Johnny Brennan, Kilkenny 21-15, 11-21, 21-14. Jim Ryan had a fine double in Silver Masters, winning the B Singles event against John Kenny from Mayo

and partnering Con Collins to victory over Wexford's Tom Rossiter and Pat Lacey on a 15-21, 21-19, 21-10 scoreline in Doubles. Pat Ryan and Kevin Croke took the Novice Softball title over brothers Christy and John Joe Joyce of Westmeath in an excellent final which ended 21-20, 21-20. Josie O'Dwyer added to his haul of All-Ireland medals with a 40 x 20 Junior Singles victory over Wexford's Raymond Breen.

LIMERICK DOUBLE

Limerick brothers Tom and Billy O'Brien from Broadford had an excellent double winning the 40 x 20 Novice Doubles Championship with a very comprehensive victory over Nickey O'Reilly and Tommy Comerford, Kilkenny. They added the Junior Softball Doubles Championship later in the year defeating Kilkenny represented by Nickey O'Reilly and Joe Hickey 21-19, 21-13 to record their county's first success at this level since 1980.

Another player to achieve a marvellous double in 1995 was Corkman Tony Healy from Ballydesmond who defeated Barry Goff from the Castlebridge Club in Wexford in an excellent 40 x 20 Minor Singles final which ended 21-11, 15-21, 21-17. Tony partnered his namesake Gerard Healy in achieving a fine double over Wexford's Colin Keeling and Barry Goff 21-17, 21-14 in 40 x 20 Minor Doubles. Cork also achieved victory in the Diamond Masters Doubles 40 x 20 Championship when Mick McCarthy and Harry Hyde defeated Ray Doherty and Chubby Geary of Dublin 8-21, 21-2, 21-11.

MINOR ALL-IRELANDS FOR CARLOW

Kenneth Kane from the Garryhill Club became the first Carlow player to win a Minor Softball Singles title defeating Tony Healy comprehensively in the final. He completed the double when he partnered Oliver Ryan to win their county's first ever Minor Softball Doubles Championship, again defeating Cork represented by Tony Healy and Jerh Healy on a 21-11, 21-17 scoreline.

Wexford had an excellent Intermediate Softball Singles win through Brian Gilhooley from Castlebridge who had a comprehensive victory over Jimmy McKeon from Cavan in the final. Wexford had a second Softball victory through brothers Seamus and Martin Buggy who defeated Junior Slattery and Danny Butler, Tipperary, in Golden Masters A Doubles. This was Martin Buggy's third All-Ireland win in 1995 as he had earlier defeated Joe Collins of Cork 13-21, 21-18, 21-0 in the Golden Masters B 40 x 20 Singles final and partnered Jimmy King to victory over Joe Collins and Pat O'Brien, Cork, 11-21, 21-16, 21-19 in the Golden Masters B 40 x 20 Doubles final.

LOUTH AND ULSTER SUCCESSES

Peter McAuley from Louth enhanced his reputation as a topclass player by defeating Eddie Corbett who was going for his third Senior 40 x 20 Singles title in a row, 21-19, 16-21, 21-19 in a marvellous contest. His fellow countyman Joey Maher won yet another All-Ireland title defeating Harry Hyde of Cork in the Diamond Masters 40 x 20 Singles final.

Ulster players dominated the Intermediate 40 x 20 Championships with Ciarán Curran of Tír Eoghain defeating Tommy Hynes, Loch Garman, 21-14, 19-21,21-7 in Singles and Josie MacAllister and Stevie Madden, Aontroim, defeating Tommy Hynes and Ned Buggy, Loch Garman 21-15, 20-21, 21-17 in Doubles. The Novice Singles Championship went to Seán Mac Corraidh, Aontroim, who had a good 21-13, 21-11 win over Francie Cunningham of Dublin.

FIVE TITLES FOR CLARE

Three members of the Kirby family were on the winning side

for Clare in 40 x 20 finals. Darragh partnered Fergal Coughlan to a good win over Joe Lynch and Jimmy Reilly of Meath in Junior Doubles. His father John had a relatively easy win over Seamus Reade, Kilkenny, in Silver Masters A Singles and partnered Michael Hogan to a 21-7, 21-18 win over Seamus Reade and Anthony Greene, Kilkenny, in Doubles. The third family member, Dan, defeated Nicholas Clancy, Galway, 21-12, 21-13 in the Golden Masters A Singles final and was partnered by Jimmy Walsh to a 21-11, 21-10 win over Pakie Ryan and Joe Maxwell of Dublin in the Golden Masters A Doubles final.

Waterford's Declan Mulcahy won three titles in Emerald Masters. He defeated Michael Lally, Galway, 21-10, 21-17 in the 40 x 20 Singles final and defeated Matt Ryan of Dublin rather easily in Softball. He then partnered Br Finbar Spring to retain their Emerald Masters Doubles title in 60 x 30 with a good win over Matt Ryan and Syl Dowd of Dublin.

Waterford's fifth overage title came through Mossy Butler who defeated John Browne of Kildare 21-18, 21-6 in the Golden Masters A Singles Softball final.

OTHER OVERAGE CHAMPIONSHIPS

Mickey Walsh of Roscommon put in some fine performance to win both Masters A Singles titles. He defeated Billy Mullin Tipperary, 19-21, 21-11, 21-11 in Softball and was victorious over Pat Morris of Cork in 40 x 20. Roscommon won two other overage Softball Championships with Tony Hannon and Martin Bruen scoring a 21-20, 21-14 win over Paul Hayes and Chris Hurley of Cork in Masters B Doubles and Michael Naughton and Frank Kenny teaming up to defeat Waterford's John Kiely and Johnny Wall in Diamond Masters Doubles.

The 40 x 20 Masters A Doubles title went to Billy Mullins and Paddy Hope of Offaly who recorded a 21-9, 21-16 win over Pat Morris and Paul Hayes, Cork. The Offaly players had to give best to Billy McCarthy and Billy Mullins, Tipperary, who won the Masters A Softball Doubles final 21-6, 21-16. Joe Rossiter, Cill Dara, achieved a fine double defeating Sean O'Mahoney of Waterford 21-8, 21-16 in the Silver Masters B 40 x 20 Singles final and partnering Vinny Wrynn to a 21-8, 21-12 victory over Tony Buckley and Dan O'Brien, Cork, in the Silver Masters B Doubles 40 x 20 championship. The Golden Masters B Singles Softball title went to Nicholas Clancy of Galway who defeated Joe Collins, Cork, 20-21, 21-15, 21-9 in an excellent final who the Doubles title went to Pat Farren and Declan Quigley of Dublin who outscored Pat Gleeson and Mick Fitzpatrick of Tipperary 21-14, 11-21, 21-9.


ALL-IRELAND JUVENILE CHAMPIONSHIPS

There was a reasonable spread of winners in the All-Ireland Juvenile Championships. Nine counties shared the sixteen titles with Cork and Cavan taking four each. Seven titles went to Leinster while Munster took five and Ulster four. Tim Breen of Cork had an excellent double in U14 Singles while Eoin Kennedy achieved a similar feat in U16 Singles. Patrick Finnegan and Alan McCabe from Cavan achieved a fine double in the U14 Doubles Championships. Cavan also won the U16 Doubles 40 x 20 title

through Paul Brady and Pádraig Kiernan and the U16 Softball Doubles title went to Kilkenny's Mark Dunne and Daniel Love. Paraic McMahon, winner of three Féile na nGael team medals with Castlebridge brought the U15 40 x 20 Singles title to Wexford while Carl Browne of Meath won the U15 Softball Singles title. The U15 Doubles championships went to Derek Tobin and David Butler of Tipperary in the 40 x 20 court and to Cavan's Ryan McCormack and Terence Tinnelly in Softball. David Stapleton of Carlow had an excellent 11-15, 15-13, 15-14 victory over Colm Jordan of Cork in the U17 40 x 20 Singles championship but the Corkman gained compensation in the big court winning his first All-Ireland title. Thomas Dillon and Niall Cronin brought victory to Cork in the U17 40 x 20 Doubles championship. Michael Lennon and Desmond Willoughby, Wicklow, won the U17 Doubles Softball title.

The success of Cavan and Cork in winning four titles each reflects the intense juvenile development and coaching programmes which have been carried out in those counties in recent years. It takes a lot of coaching and development to bring players to All-Ireland standard. This requires much hard work, dedication and commitment to the development of players and

of the game. Success never comes before hard work and any player or county aspiring to All-Ireland honours must be dedicated to the game. One of the very encouraging results of All-Ireland success for several players is the fact that their successes have attracted many more young members to the game in their own areas. This is also very encouraging for the successful players as local heroes who have achieved national status and they in turn can pass on the value of their knowledge and experience to younger players.

JUVENILE TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

The introduction of the All-Ireland Juvenile Team Championships at Under 12/13 and 14/15 level in 1994 is one of the best developments in handball within the last decade. There is tremendous interest in these championships which offer county representation to additional groups of players. The counties which do take part in the championships are very enthusiastic about them but there are many counties which do not participate. These must be encouraged to do so, particularly as a way of developing juvenile handball. Because of the fact that the championships are team events the performance of every player in the team is important.

Wexford, Galway, Tipperary and Tyrone reached the All-Ireland U12/13 40 x 20 semi-finals with Tipperary defeating Wexford 90-55 in the final. Ulster was not represented in the U12/13 60 x 30 Championship. Kilkenny defeated Roscommon 77-56 in the Leinster-Connacht semi-final and Tipperary with five of the same team which won the 40 x 20 title being victorious over Kilkenny on a 90-69 scoreline in the final.

Tipperary and Kilkenny were victorious over Tyrone and Mayo respectively in the U14/15 40 x 20 semi-finals. Kilkenny had a 71-47 victory over Tipperary in the final. Wexford easily accounted for Roscommon in the U14/15 competition and defeated Limerick 90-42 in the final.

These Team Championships provided some excellent handball and are certain to develop the talents of players who have not previously won major titles. I wish to again emphasise the importance of the Team Championships as a major vehicle for the development of juvenile handball. It provides an incentive for Clubs to develop their players with a view to representing their counties and it gives the players the ambition to do so. However, each Provincial Council must encourage every county to take part in the Championships. While this means defeat for 50% of the teams in the first round it is an opportunity for each county to assess its own strength and give an indication of the level of coaching and development needed in each county.

CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS

The level of interest in the Club Championships is, to say the least, most disappointing. It is a great pity that so many Clubs have adopted the attitude that if they have no chance of success they will not take part. The obvious question which must be asked is what is the future of these Championships? With so few entries is there any point in organising them at all? It is time now to address this issue. As for the National League, a minimum number of entries should be required for each competition based on the status of all the Clubs in each province.

The 40 x 20 Club Championships were won by Naomh Pádraig of Dublin who defeated Liscarroll of Cork in Novice, Brackey (Tyrone) who were victorious over Garda Club in Junior and Kells who defeated Cashel in the Open Final. The 60 x 30 Novice Club Championship was won by Mullingar who defeated Horse and Jockey 105-73 in the final. The Junior title went to Castlebridge who defeated Kingscourt on a 121-83 scoreline and the Open final was won by O'Loughlin's who defeated St. Mary's, Clonmel 101-91.

HARDBALL

There were 56 entries for the six All-Ireland Hardball Championships, 17 at Minor level, 21 at Junior and 18 in Senior. However, there were 13 withdrawals covering all three grades. Peter McAuley, An Lu, won his third successive All-Ireland Senior Hardball Singles title and his fourth in all defeating Billy Bourke, Cill Chainnigh, 21-12, 21-8 in the final. Eddie Corbett and Noel Ryan, Tiobraid Arann, took the Senior Doubles title, defeating Tom Sheridan and Egin Jensen (An Mhí) in an excellent three game final on a 21-17, 10-21, 21-13 scoreline. Anthony Campbell, Cill Dara, had a double winning the Junior Singles title over Seamus Hussey, Tir Eoghain, 21-11, 21-8 and partnering Trevor Winders to defeat Philly Parsons and Michael Nolan, Cill Chainnigh 21-17, 21-15 in Doubles. Vincent Moran, Muigheo, also recorded a double defeating Daragh Ward, Cill Dara, 14-21, 21-4, 21-18 in Singles and teaming up with Campbell Brennan to defeat Wexford's Sean Nolan and James Doyle 21-17, 21-7 in the Doubles event.

Despite the withdrawals the Championships were run off smoothly. However, there was very little support for the games. The game of hardball is discussed at Congress every year. Many people say the standard of play has been falling. The point is also made that people no longer want to take up the game or have an interest in it. Apart from two counties, hardball is not promoted at all and even when Novice Provincial Championships

were offered there was very little interest in them.

The lack of quality hardballs has been a problem for a number of years but thanks to the work of Anthony and Mary Campbell from Ballymore Eustace through their hardball making seminar in December last a number of people are now making hardballs. This should ensure a steady supply of hardballs and if the goodwill is there it should not be a major problem for counties and provinces to organise hardball coaching and suitable competitions to introduce players to the game. If this is not done the danger is that the game will decline further to a point where it could be lost forever. This must not be allowed to happen. We have a duty to preserve hardball which has been part of the central tradition and history of handball in Ireland. We owe it to the game itself and to the people who played and promoted it in the past to preserve it for future generations.

NATIONAL LEAGUES

The 40 x 20 National League which attracted 11 teams from 10 counties was a very good competition and provided many attractive and excellent games. It is certainly a great pity that there were so few entries. The League is a competition which affords counties the opportunity to take part in a national competition but it appears that many of them are reluctant to enter if they feel they do not have a chance of doing well. This deprives players of the opportunity of representing their counties and of developing their game in top class competition.

The 40 x 20 National League was won by Westmeath who defeated Cork 97-64 in the final while the 60 x 30 League had to be cancelled due to the small number of entries received. If the Leagues are to have a reasonable future they must be supported by at least half the counties in the country. Perhaps the time is opportune to examine the possibility of having two divisions in both 40 x 20 and 60 x 30. The introduction of a second division might attract more counties to enter and this would certainly be in the interest of the game.

COLÁISTÍ

Seven schools shared the eight 40x20 and 60x30 All-Ireland Colleges titles. Leinster schools won six of these with one title each going to Ulster and Connacht.

I wish to express the thanks and appreciation of Arc Chomhairle to Tomás Ó Briain, Laighean, Micheál Ó Fuireastal, Mumha, An tAthair Mac Sheoinín, Connacht and An tAthair Mac Giolla Ghuala for their organisation of the provincial colleges championships. The number of colleges taking part has increased somewhat over the past couple of years and the competitions are better organised than heretofore. While it is satisfying to record this there are many other colleges which should be taking part in the Championships. I would urge every Provincial Council to look at this as a major area for development of handball. Where necessary, Clubs and counties should help out with regard to arrangements including fixtures, transport, coaching and making facilities available for the games.

I would also like to thank and congratulate the teachers who are involved in the promotion and organisation of handball in second level schools. Handball may not be a top priority in many schools but we certainly appreciate the efforts of the teachers who do organise the game.

I would like to again suggest that serious consideration be given to the organisation of a schools team championship. This would certainly help to promote the game and would make the schools and colleges less reliant on the talent produced by local Clubs. A team championship would also encourage and reward

schools which make a genuine effort to promote the game. Schools would then be less reliant on the individual stars to represent them in competition. More players would have the opportunity of representing their schools and there would be an increase in the pool of players available for competition.

WINNERS

Kenneth Kane representing Presentation De La Salle, Muine Bheag, took both Senior Singles titles. He had comfortable wins over Aidrian Marrinan of St. Flannan's College, Ennis, in 40 x 20 and Paul Coleman, St. Anne's, Killaloe in 60 x 30.

The 40 x 20 Senior Doubles title went to Vincent Moran and Campbell Brennan of St. Nathy's College, Ballaghaderreen who had a 21-5, 21-19 victory over Shane McCullagh and Niall Ward of Omagh C.B.S. in the final.

St. Peter's of Wexford represented by Barry Goff and Robert Cleary defeated Paraic Gaffney and Denis Creaton of St. Nathy's in the Softball Doubles final.

The Junior Singles titles went to Eoin Kennedy of Coolmine C.S. who defeated Ryan McCormack of St. Patrick's College, Cavan in 40 x 20 and to Carl Browne of Kells Community School who had an easy victory over Brian Marrinan of St. Flannan's College in the 60 x 30 code.

Alan Dowling and Michael Falsey of Kilkenny C.B.S. defeated Alan O'Dwyer and Niall Cotter of St. Coleman's College, Fermoy in the 40 x 20 Junior Doubles final.

Terence Tinnelly and Ryan McCormack, St. Patrick's College, Cavan had a 21-10, 21-11 victory over Brian Tansey and Desmond Keegan of St. Nathy's in the Junior Softball Doubles Championship.

THIRD LEVEL COLLEGES

The Third Level Colleges Championships were hosted in splendid manner by U.C.G. The organisation of the games and the social programme was a credit to all concerned. There has been a tremendous increase in the interest shown in the Championships over the past few years, especially since the Regional Technical Colleges and other Third Level Institutes have taken part.

Queen's University, Belfast won the 'A' Team Championship, while the 'B' Championship was won by U.C.G. whose captain, Liam Reidy, also won the Open 'B' Singles competition. Ciarán Curran from Queen's won the Open Singles title for the third successive year while Yvonne Gacquin of U.C.G. retained the Ladies Open Singles title.

COLLEGES BLITZ

A very successful Colleges blitz was hosted by U.C.D. in December. This inaugural event was reasonably well supported with eight Colleges taking part. It has great potential for further development and, like the Championships, is certainly destined to become another highlight of the Colleges handball season.

The weekend format for the blitz competition is much more suitable for Colleges than playing occasional mid-week league games. Apart from a national blitz, consideration should now be given to regional blitzes in future years.

Third Level competitions also have great potential for the development ladies handball. Many young ladies players who graduate from Club and second level can now represent their Colleges in the Ladies competitions. Every College Club must make a determined effort to promote and encourage ladies handball. One way of doing this, as has already been suggested, would be to introduce a Mixed Doubles competition.

Apart from the Colleges which take part in the competition handballers in several other Third Level Colleges do not take part purely because there is no Handball Club in many of them. This is another area for development which should be examined by each Provincial Council. Indeed, every county in which there is a Third Level College should promote the game there and give the opportunity to the College to take part in county competition. It is vital for the future health of handball that we involve today's students in our competitions and encourage them to become involved in the administration of handball.

WATERFORD CRYSTAL IRISH NATIONALS

The inaugural Waterford Crystal Irish Nationals attracted an entry of 243 players in four ladies and ten male events from 15 and Under to Golden Masters level. Despite the logistical problems which many Clubs had to overcome to have players at several venues in different grades in the early stages of the Nationals, the event was an outstanding success.

The host Clubs did an excellent job in catering for such a concentrated programme of matches. We are very grateful to the Clubs for the use of their facilities and to the officials who did marvellous work to ensure that all games were played according to plan. Our thanks, too, to the referees and those who provided hospitality for everybody. The main Nationals/Awards Coiste, led by Seán Mac an tSaoi, Uachtarán, who pioneered both events, did an extraordinary amount of work over a short period of time in planning the Nationals and Awards.

On behalf of everybody who took part in or was associated

with either or both we place on record our thanks and appreciation for their efforts.

T.V. COVERAGE

One major concern regarding the Nationals was the fact that the main events at Ceannaras Liathróid Láimhe na hÉireann did not attract large attendances. This was very disappointing, not alone in view of the quality of players and games on show but also in not complementing the players and games with audiences which would be expected for such a prestigious T.V. tournament. This impacts very directly on the image of handball: we must support — and be seen to support — our own sport. Good attendances at the main fixtures for 1996 will be vital to securing further T.V. coverage. This year the Committee has decided that no other fixtures will clash with the TV recording; it will be up to all players and supporters to help make our showcase games the spectacle they can and should be.

USHA JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS

For the second successive year the Irish handball team took four of the five championships in which they were entered in the USHA Junior Championships in Orlando from 27 to 29 December. Julie Long (Ath Cliath) and Fiona McKenna (Naomh Pól, Aontroim) won the Girls 15 and Under and 17/19 and Under titles respectively. Timmy Clifford, O'Loughlins, Cill Chainnigh, was the ninth Irish person to win the boys 15 and Under championship in the past fourteen years while Kenneth Kane (Garryhill, Ceatharlach) retained his 17 and Under title. In addition, Terry Gainfort, who was entered separately by the Castlebridge Club in Wexford, won the Boys 13 and Under event. Official Irish team players have now won 24 US Junior titles since Michael 'Duxie' Walsh won the 15 and Under title in 1981.

These performances augur very well for the future of Irist youth handball and our achievements have attracted lavish praise from our USA counterparts. However, if we are to progress from here, it is essential that our top youth players have an ongoing coaching and development programme. They also need more intensive competition to have any prospect of keeping up with the American players who graduate so successfully to senior status when they engage in the top professional tournaments.

On behalf of the players, their families and Clubs, I wish to thank and congratulate Jimmy King, National Coach, who prepared the team so thoroughly and Eddie Corbett, Team Manager, who looked after every detail and need of the 29 strong party for the entire duration of the trip. Our thanks, also, to the other adults who helped the Manager and congratulations to all the additional players who travelled at their own expense to take part in a very memorable USHA Juniors. An added bonus was that Timmy Clifford was voted Best New Player of the Championships.

Congratulations are also due to Ciarán Heneghan, St Coman's



Club, Roscomáin, who won the USHA 'C' Singles title last June and to Gus Sweeney (Mayo) who was defeated in the 'B' Singles final. It is worth recording that a party of 18 people travelled to Houston, Texas, at their own expense for the U.S. Nationals.

INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The initiative by the Irish Handball Council to spread handball in Britain and Europe continued last year with gratifying results. The 'new' countries that attended the World Championships in 1994 — Holland, Wales, England, France and Finland — were highly impressed with the sport, organisation and entertainment. Each country has been active this year in promoting the game with the full backing of the Irish Handball Council.

In May the Welsh Handball Association hosted the First European One Wall Games attracting entries from the above countries as well as teams from New York, Belgium and London-Irish. The Belgians were the surprise of the tournament having victories over all the countries except the Americans and the Welsh pushing the Irish players into fourth place. The event got almost two hours coverage on B.B.C. Howard Jones and his team have introduced the game to local schools, Sports Centres and to the University of Cardiff. They will be holding tournaments this year in May and September.

In June President De Winne of the Belgian Handball Association visited Ireland and discussed with the Council the prospect of holding the second European Tournament in Belgium this year. They have got together with the French Handball Association, adopted the Irish handball rules and held the first Belgian/French Youth International under these rules on the 25th February. They have also contacted the Dutch to arrange reciprocal games.

In July Sean McEntee and International Officer Tom O'Connor were guests of the **Dutch Handball Association** for their National Finals in Francker. The Dutch, whose own game is played outdoor in summer, were interested in setting up an indoor handball game and were deciding between Irish handball and Spanish pelota. The Irish visit and the demonstration of both one wall and four wall games will, we think, be crucial in this respect. This became apparent in February 1996 when three of their top players, an official of the D.H.A. and a T.V. producer made a five day tour of Ireland. Hosted by Croke Park, Bray and Kilkenny Clubs, all codes of our game were demonstrated and Dutch T.V. are returning in June to do a film on the game.

Individual players of Rugby Fives and Eton Fives from England played in the Dublin and Welsh games and their reports in the Fives newsletters have given rise to the prospect of handball being adopted by players of this similar game. Like the Dutch, they see it as giving them an international outlet which their own game lacks as well as the lower cost, especially in setting up one wall. A school team from Malvern College in the west of England, toured Ireland in December playing games very successfully in Bray, Cavan, Dungarvan and Ballaghaderreen. Their Association is meeting with the

Welsh to look at the prospect of having handball played in the Commonwealth Games. The event, they think, would attract players from Australia, Canada, Nigeria, South Africa and many other countries where either fives or handball is played. At least fifty countries attending the games would see our game and report it in their own media.

In **Finland** the second National One Wall Games were completed in August. The first **Mexican One Wall Games** took place in Guadalupe in September. The **French** have joined the World Handball Council and the **Spanish** have expressed interest especially in establishing relations with Ireland.

The expansion of the game worldwide needs the support of all. There are handball courts in many European cities, built after the war for U.S. Forces, and handballers visiting should demonstrate the game in these centres (now used mainly for racquetball). But the one wall game may be the vehicle by which handball could take off in Europe. It can be demonstrated anywhere—"where there's a wall there's a way". Each Club should also consider how this simple (but highly skilful) form might help to bring newcomers and youth to the game. This was the way the original game was played and the way in which many of the older handballers came to learn the basic skills. Maybe it's time to reconsider one wall as the way forward both at home and abroad.

ADMINISTRATION

I feel it is opportune for all units from club to national level to review their administration structures with particular reference to the committee structures at the upper levels. There is a great need to establish better links between similar committees at county, provincial and national levels. There should be more direct links between those units with regard to work in areas such as coaching, juvenile development, fixtures and administration.

Consideration might also be given to establishing a three-year term for some central committees, for example, the Coaching Council and the Development Committee with their term of office to coincide with that of the Uachtarán. This would help facilitate the implementation of various plans and projects over a three-year period which does not necessarily happen over the present twelve month period following which committee elections take place. The three-year term has been very successful in Cumann Lúthchleas Gael where the vast majority of committees and work groups operate on that basis. A similar move would greatly benefit handball.

Handball units at all levels have a lot of ground to make up in being involved in the affairs of Cumann Lüthchleas Gael as a whole: far too many units do not maintain proper links with our parent-body — and this is to the detriment of both handball and the Association. Where we exercise our right of representation fully and properly, the benefits are tangible in better relationships, a knowledge and appreciation by the G.A.A. of the work of handball units, an understanding of the difficulties and problems of our sport, opportunities to promote and publicise handball generally and a willingness on the part of the Association to assist and promote the game.

If we wish to gain the benefits of being part of Cumann Luthchleas Gael, we must be prepared to take our rightful place in the Association: only then can we hope and expect to have our sport as we would like it to be.

FÉILE NA nGAEL

Féile na nGael was again very successfully hosted by Coiste Liathroid Láimhe Luimní. Competition was very keen in all six team events before the following winners emerged:

REVIEW OF FÉILE

Feile na nGael offers an excellent opportunity for any club to avail of a very well organised and hospitable weekend within the GAA calendar. It is a much sought after prize by hurling and camogic clubs and also by many handball clubs. However, some counties do not appear to appreciate the value of Feile as a team event and as a social and cultural weekend as well.

One of the many benefits of participation in Féile is the longlasting friendships that are built up between clus and individuals

from different parts of the country which are often followed up by exchange visits over the years and further contact in competitions at juvenile and adult level. If every county appreciated fully the value of participating in Feile na nGael, I am confident that there would be a much increased entry in the competitions.

On another level, it appears that many counties do not take the selection of teams for Féile na nGael as seriously as they should. Several counties do not have any entries and others have no qualifying competitions at county level. This means that in many cases the same clubs enter the competition year after year whereas the whole purpose of Féile na nGael is to provide every club with the opportunity to qualify for entry to this major national festival. Therefore, I strongly urge every county, especially as part of its juvenile development plan, to organise a qualifying competition for Féile na nGael. In this way, clubs who take part will feel they have qualified for the event in a meaningful way and can better represent themselves and their counties.

COMHAIRLE NA mBAN

Comhairle na mBan had another successful year with the main emphasis on underage development and competition. The inclusion of a girls competition in Féile na nGael, the participation of girls in the Irish team in the U.S.H.A. Juniors, the introduction of a Ladies Open Singles event in the Third Level Colleges Championships and the amalgamation of Comhairle na mBan with the Irish Handball Council have all helped enhance the profile of ladies handball during the past year.

Congratulations to the Ladies Council on its silver jubilee which will be celebrated in a number of ways later in 1996. Let us hope that our Clubs and handball in general will promote and develop ladies handball much more actively and vigorously this year. The ladies have made great progress but the potential for

development lies largely untapped. Most of the work falls on the shoulders of a small number of very dedicated coaches and officials, They need a lot more help to develop the sport: we must provide that support which will be for the further benefit of handball as a whole.

DUBLIN HANDBALL

At the time of writing, it appears that the long-running problems arising from the demolition of the old 60 x 30 court in the re-development of Hill 16 in 1988 are about to be settled with the establishment of a Trust Fund for the development of handball and of handball facilities in Dublin. A sum of £150,000 is being made available by Cumann Lúthchleas Gael for this and

criteria for the use of the money are still to be agreed. Judicious use of the money over a considerable period of time will be a major boost to handball in the capital city where the game needs to be developed in clubs and schools. If handball is in a healthy state in Dublin, it would have a great impact on the sport throughout the country.

Coiste Liathroid Laimhe Atha Cliath began an intensive juvenile coaching and development programme over a year ago which is proving very successful. However, it must be expanded and Clubs must be formed in the first instance around existing facilities which are very much underused at present. This will require a lot of hard work but Dublin has the personnel with the ability and leadership needed to effect a major change in the fortunes of handball in the county.

The newly-formed Dublin Juvenile Committee is working well and I am confident that it will give a lead which many counties will follow in the future. The main point is that the dark cloud which cast a long shadow over handball in general for past eight years will soon be dissipated.

I would like to extend a cead mile failte to Joe Warren who has been appointed as temporary Bar Manager and wish him well in this post.


MEMBERSHIP AND FINANCE

It is a source of great concern that Ceannáras membership has declined seriously over the past seven years as shown in the following table:

This decline has serious implications for income from membership: fewer people are using our facilities which means a further loss in income from court fees.

The Ceannaras Club income for the year was down from £12,067 (1994) to £10,222 while expenditure decreased from £20,650 to £17,821 — mainly due to the closure of the gymnasium.

However, the profit margin was down slightly and the surplus for the year decreased from £13,322 in 1994 to £10,136 in 1995.

The overall surplus for the year between Club and Lounge was £2,537. This is a very small amount when we take into account the capital expenditure on the Centre and the overall resources at our disposal. Centres such as ours should be able to generate a profit of at least £25,000 per annum. If Ceannáras Liathróid Láimhe na hÉireann is to be viable at all we must market the Centre and its facilities, we must increase membership and provide a lot more activities for members in a major effort to increase income to a level consistent with the potential of this major resource.

COSPÓIR

Comhairle Liathróid Láimhe na hÉireann wishes to record its appreciation of the grant aid received from the Cospoir allocation of National Lottery Funds. Without this it would be impossible to maintain a full-time service to handball. Indeed, the annual grant of £51,000 in 1995 was critical to the operations of the Council.

We also acknowledge the provision of £2,000 towards the cost of the Irish team which took part in the U.S.H.A. Junior Championships in December. We also received a grant of £2,000 towards the purchase of office equipment and a further £2,000 towards the participation of our guest players in the Waterford

Crystal Irish Nationals. Grants of £1,000 each were allocated to Jackie Keating, Michael Walsh and Walter O'Connor.

I would like to express our sincere thanks to Mr. Paddy Heffernan, Chief Executive of Cospoir and his many staff who have helped us in processing our grant applications and with advice on many occasions during the past year. We also acknowledge the support of Mr. Bernard Allen, Minister of State at An Roinn Oideachais.

We are all very well aware of the levels of crime in society today and of the increase of violent crime and the consequent effect of this on local communities. The work of Government agencies in dealing with the prevention of crime would be much more effective and much less required if major funding were available for the promotion of sport in this country. If the tide is to be turned in the battle against crime very substantial resources must be put into the development of sport. Sports organisations need major financial assistance to implement their plans. There should be positive discrimination to help disadvantaged areas. In this context the game of handball would be an ideal medium to which people could be attracted to a very active sport giving them the opportunity for self development and the possiblity of being involved in their local communities in a very meaningful and tangible way.

BUÍOCHAS

On behalf of Ard Chomhairle, and on a personal note, I wish to thank and congratulate the hundreds of voluntary members of our organistion who devote so much of their time and energies to the promotion and organisation of handball. I would like to pay a special tribute to the coaches and officials who look after the vital area of juvenile handball. They perform a major service for

the game and, quite often, their work goes unseen and unacclaimed. However, these people are the real custodians of the future of handball as they pass on their skills and dedication to the younger generation.

Our thanks are due, also, to all county officers, especially the Rúnaithe Contae who carry out a major role in the organisation of handball. I also thank the Provincial Secretaries on organising their programmes and for their co-operation and help in forwarding information to the office. I would also like to thank all members of our central Coisti for their help in the administration of national handball affairs. They give a tremendous commitment to handball and I value their advice and assistance on many issues.

Special tribute is also due to Cionnaith Ó Chonbhui on carrying out his duties so well as Cisteoir of Comhairle Liathróid Láimhe na hÉireann. He has brought a very professional approach to his role which is of great benefit to Ard Chomhairle and to the organisation as a whole.

I thank all our players, coaches and referees without whom the game could not prosper. Their help and co-operation is always forthcoming and is very much appreciated.

Many thanks are due to the GAA central office staff for their advice and support in very many ways throughout the year. A special go raibh maith agaibh is due to Roibeard Mac Ailín and Muireann Ní Mhainnín who assist people as they come to Aras Dáimhín.

On behalf of all members, players and units, and on a personal note, I wish to express my thanks to Aingeal Nic Lochlainn for her dedication to her work for Comhairle Liathróid Láimhe na hÉireann. She has been most helpful to everybody and deals very capably with whatever matters arise.


