STANDING ORDERS

In order that the proceedings of the Congress be carried out expeditiously, the following Standing Orders will be observed:

- 1. The proposer of a Resolution or an Amendment thereto may speak for 5 minutes, but not more than 5 minutes.
- A delegate speaking to a Resolution, or an Amendment must not exceed 3 minutes.
 A maximum of two delegates from any one county shall speak on any one motion.
- 3. The proposer of a Resolution or Amendment may speak a second time for 3minutes before a vote is taken, but no other Delegate may speak a second time to the same Resolution or Amendment.
- 4. The Chairman may at any time he considers a matter has been sufficiently discussed call on the Proposer for a reply, and when that has been given a vote must be taken.

- 5. A delegate may, with the consent of the Chairman, move "that the question be now put", after which, when the Proposer has spoken, a vote must be taken.
- A speaker to National Manager's report or to any other general discussion shall not exceed 3 minutes on any one topic.
- Any motion seeking to amend a rule in Fo-Rialacha (GAA Handball Ireland) must have a majority equal to two-thirds of those present entitled to vote and voting.
- 8. Standing Orders shall not be suspended for the purpose of considering any matter not on the agenda, except by the consent of a majority equal to two-thirds of those present entitled to vote and voting.
- The Chairman may change the order of items on the agenda with the support of a simple majority of those present entitled to vote and voting.

Current Rule: CENTRAL COUNCIL - 29 (B)

The President, National Manager, President-elect, immediate past President and non-GAA Handball Representative shall not be represented by proxies at meetings of the Council. A Provincial President may be represented by another officer of the Provincial Council with 7 days prior notice.

The President, National Manager, President-elect, immediate past President and non-GAA Handball Representative shall not be represented by proxies at meetings of the Council. It shall, at its first meeting each year ratify members to the various national Committees (within the Association's Strategic Plan) as decided from time to time by Annual or Special National Annual General Meetings. It shall also appoint representatives to the National Strategic Planning Committee and Chairperson of said Committees, whom shall hold office for a maximum 5 year term.

MOTION 12.

It shall, at its first meeting each year ratify members to the various national Committees (within the Association's Strategic Plan) as decided from time to time by Annual or Special National Annual General Meetings. The Chairpersons of the committees would be recommended by a committee comprising of President, Provincial Chairpersons and Head of Handball/National Manager). It shall also appoint representatives to the National Strategic Planning Committee and Chairperson of said Committees, whom shall hold office for a maximum 5 year term. The national committee may form other committees as they require during the year.

Current Rule: POWERS AND FUNCTIONS OF CENTRAL COUNCIL – 33 (A)

The Central Competitions Control Committee shall consist of the National Fixtures & Events Officer, the four Provincial Appointed Representatives and two other members appointed by the Central Council. It shall have a three year term of office. It shall be responsible for all arrangements for and control of any matter arising from competitions under the jurisdiction of the Central Council and matters arising from same, including disciplinary matters other than those functions reserved to the G.A.A. Central Hearings Committee. It shall investigate and process matters relating to the Enforcement of Rules, including hearing Objections and Counter Objections, from competitions under its control. Hearings, where prescribed, shall be heard by the Central Hearings Committee.

MOTION 13.

The Central Competitions Control Committee shall consist of the National Fixtures Officer (with no voting rights), Head of Handball (with no voting rights), the four Provincial Appointed Representatives and two other named members appointed by the Central Council. It shall have a three year term of office. Provincial appointed representatives may be represented by a nominated proxy. It shall be responsible for all arrangements for and control of any matter arising from competitions under the jurisdiction of the Central Council and matters arising from same, including disciplinary matters other than those functions reserved to the G.A.A. Central Hearings Committee. It shall investigate and process matters relating to the Enforcement of Rules, including hearing Objections and Counter Objections, from competitions under its control. Hearings, where prescribed, shall be heard by the Central Hearings Committee.

MOTION 14: Submitted by larmhí

Current Rule: Competition Regulation 59.

That in the case where a player cannot fulfil a championship game, including Senior, (except in the case of the death of an immediate family member) on the dates outlined in the National Clar then the County must field a substitute or concede the match. However, if the opposing county is willing to refix the match, then it shall be played at a venue nominated by the opposing county.

MOTION 14:

Regulation 59 be amended to read "That in the case where a player cannot fulfil a championship game, including Senior, (except in the case of the death of an immediate family member) as per latest fixture released then the County must field a substitute or concede the match. However, if the opposing county is willing to refix the match, then it shall be played at a venue nominated by the opposing county.

JANUARY

On January 8/9, Breacach HC in Tyrone hosted the inaugural Mick Kerr Memorial tournament. Born in 1934, Mick, whose sons and grandchildren are all involved in handball, made an immense contribution to both Gaelic Football and handball in the Beragh area for over 70 years. Galway's Martin Mulkerrins defeated Charly Shanks in the final, 15-11, 12-15, 11-5.

Next up was another big event in Tyrone as the She's Ace female-only event took place and saw Catriona Casey take gold in the top grade. At underage level, Hannah Grace (Tipperary), and Tyrone pair Caislin Treacy and Keeva Owens also tasted success. At the end of January, the first 'Major' of the season, the Adult 4-Wall Nationals, were staged in Belfast. The big winner over the weekend was Clare's Colin Crehan, who claimed his first Men's Open Singles title at the Irish Nationals, the first 'Major' of the season.

Crehan defeated doubles partner Diarmaid Nash 11–5 in a tiebreaker in an outstanding final. Crehan had seen off Kilkenny's Peter Funchion, quarter-final conqueror of Martin Mulkerrins in the upset of the tournament, in the semi-final, with Nash seeing off Armagh's Charly Shanks.

Meanwhile, Casey won the ladies final against first-time finalist Megan McCann of Armagh.

FEBRUARY

The Irish Collegiate Handball Association 4-Wall Singles, the best-attended and most prestigious event on the Third Level handball calendar, took place in early February in Belfast venues. Star performers on the weekend were Kildare's Kevin Diggins, in the colours of DCU, and Roscommon's Fiona Tully (NUIG). Diggins defeated Peter Donohoe (NUIG) 15-6, 15-6 in the Men's Open Singles final, with Tully seeing off Eilise McCrory (Liverpool JM) in the Ladies final (15-13, 15-5). The tournament attracted a field of 99 players, including 25 ladies.

The student players again took pride of place in late February when a group of 20 travelled to Springield, Missousi for the USHA Collegiates. The Irish players dominated the competition. Dual star Fiona Tully claimed the Ladies Open Singles crown, defeating Mairead Fox 21-7, 21-5 in the final, and teamed up with Dublin's Maedhbh Ni Dhalaigh to land the corresponding doubles title.

Cork's David Walsh landed the Men's Open Singles with a nail-biting 21-4, 5-21, 11-10 win over Galway man Diarmuid Mulkerrins.



Walsh also won the doubles with his brother Conor, surviving his second tiebreaker of the day in defeating Mankato State's Ray Ure and Michael Gaulton.

MARCH

March saw the early rounds of the All-Ireland 4-wall championships in senior grades as well as All-Ireland semi-finals in other adult grades and at juvenile levels.

The All-Ireland Senior 4-Wall Singles quarter-finals and semi-finals were played in Kingscourt over the weekend of March 12-13, one of the best weekends of action all year.

The big result of the weekend saw Clare's Diarmaid Nash defeat Galway's 2018 champ Martin Mulkerrins in straight games to advance to his second Senior Singles final. The Tuamgraney lefty defeated Kilkenny's Peter Funchion in the quarters before turning on the style to see off Mulkerrins 21–5, 21–14 with a commanding display. Four-time winner Robbie McCarthy eased past Charly Shanks (21–10, 21–10) in the semi-final, having impressed in the quarter-final against another Banner star, Colin Crehan.

In the ladies Senior Singles semi-finals, Limerick's Martina McMahon and Cork's Catriona Casey came through in impressive fashion against Megan McCann and Eilise McCrory respectively. The finals attracted a large crowd and saw a new men's champion crowned as Nash became the first player to bring the All-Ireland Senior Singles title back to the Banner County since the legendary Pat Kirby in 1980.

The left-hander played brilliantly to defeat McCarthy in a nail-biting tiebreaker. The Tuamgraney clubman was magnificent in the first set, winning 21-8 with a career-best display of two-handed offense but McCarthy found his range and raced into a 19-7 lead in game two. Nash continued to battle and rallied to reach 17 and although he was held there, he carried the momentum into the tiebreaker, tearing into a 6-0 lead. Mullingar's McCarthy cut the gap but could never get in front and on his second attempt at game ball, Nash closed it out with a pass shot for a famous win.

Nash (31) had previously lost finals to McCarthy in 2014 and 2019 but the former Clare underage hurler was not to be denied on this occasion and delivered a masterful performance in the first senior 40x20 final played in three years due to pandemic-related restrictions. Earlier, Casey defeated her great rival McMahon (Limerick) 21-18, 21-15 in the ladies Senior Singles final. McMahon was hampered by a back injury, but Casey's play was flawless as she served superbly and retrieved the explosive Treaty star's best attacking efforts. Clodagh Munroe (Tyrone) and Cormac Finn (Sligo) won the Minor Singles finals, both in tiebreakers, against Kilkenny players Amy Brennan and Kyle Jordan.

APRIL

The Senior Doubles came to the boil in April, with the semi-finals played off on the weekend of April 9/10 and the finals the following week, both hosted by Kingscourt HC.

The big news in the early rounds was a sensational win by Wexford's Galen Riordan and Mark Doyle over holders Nash and Crehan. The giant-killers beat fellow Model pair Gavin Buggy and Adam Walsh in a dramatic 11-10 tiebreaker, as did Meath's Brian Carroll and Gary McConnell, who beat Daniel Relihan and Michael Hedigan of Cork on the same score.



Kilkenny brothers Peter and Patrick Funchion defeated Kerry's Dominic Lynch and Jack O'Shea (21-7, 21-19) while in the last quarter-final, Galway's Martin and Diarmuid Mulkerrins saw off Cork's Tadgh Carroll and David Walsh (21-14, 14-21, 11-3). The Meathmen defeated Wexford (18-21, 21-11, 11-2) in the semi and with the Mulkerrins brothers coming through against the Funchions, the stage was set for a Meath v Galway decider. In a thrilling slugfest, the Kells men won the day, adding the 'small alley' crown to their previous softball successes on a 21-20, 16-21, 11-4 score line.

MAY

The Irish 4-Wall Junior Nationals were held in Monaghan and Tyrone and the latter county enjoyed a particularly profitable weekend, with Keeva Owens (13&U), Laura Duff (15&U) and Mairéad Fox (19&U) all claiming titles, with Caislin Tracey, Clodagh Munroe and Cloda Nic Con Midhe reaching finals. The other female winner was Leah Minogue from Clare, who claimed the 17&U title.

In the boys grades, Paul Rodgers (Clare) defeated Galway's Bertie Donohoe in the 13&U final, Wexford's Joshua Roche won the 15&U decider against Noah Manogue from Kilkenny and Kilkenny's Kyle Jordan emerged victorious in the 17&U final against his great rival, Sligo's Cormac Finn. The national Gael Linn finals, played on a mixed doubles format for U13 boys and girls, took place at Salthill HC on the second weekend in May and saw Cork's Ballydesmond come out on top in the final against Windgap of Kilkenny.

Also represented in the quarter-finals were Greencastle (Tyrone), Clooney-Quin (Clare), Lisacul (Roscommon), Breacach (Tyrone), Micheál Breathnach (Galway) and Kells (Kilkenny). The popular Inis Mor wallball tournament was played in glorious sunshine in mid-May and saw Mark Doyle of Wexford and Mayo's Cuileann Burke take the open title.

JUNE

The highlights in June were the annual John West Féile nan Gael, which was hosted by Carlow, Laois and Kilkenny, and the provincial and All-Ireland softball inter-club events.

The Féile, back after a break due to pandemic-related restrictions, saw a large entry as usual. Talbot's Inch, Breacach, St Mellan's, Greencastle, Micheál Breathnachs, Ballydesmond and Kells (Kilkenny) won the seven respective boys divisions. Runners-up were Abbeyknockmoy, Clooney-Quin, Inis Mor, Talbot's Inch, Cullohil, Friary-Abbeyside and Monavea.

Loughmacrory, Breacach and Micheál Breathnachs were the girls winners, defeating Kilfane, Toonagh and Moycullen respectively. Clough-Ballacolla from Laois defeated Antrim's Naomh Éanna in the wallball boys final and added the girls title with victory over Laochra Láimhe na Modhscoile.

Over 300 players took part; this year, instead of the traditional U14 age grade, the event catered for U15s in order to allow those who missed out in the previous year to enjoy the Féile experience.

Meanwhile, the softball inter-club competitions were also completed in June. The All-Ireland finals were played in Abbeylara, Crinkle and Fahy Cross. Kells completed a 10-in-a-row with a 60-46 victory over Ballina (Tipperary).

Kilfane were comfortable winners of the Junior final against Lisacul, and Wexford club Ballymitty saw off Ulster champions Virginia in the Junior B final.



JULY

The Irish Wallball Nationals, which have traditionally been staged in Breaffy House, Castlebar this year re-located a little east to Roscommon, where Kilglass GAC, Strokestown CS and the Convent of Mercy schools were the host venues. This family-friendly event always attracts a big crowd, from Ulls to sprightly OAPs, and this year was no different.

In the end, familiar faces emerged to claim the blue riband Open titles. Tyrone's Conor McElduff saw off his cousin, Sean Kerr, in the men's final, having earlier defeated James Prentice (Tipperary) and Sean Digney (Down) while in the ladies decider, Catriona Casey – who enjoyed a stellar year all round – defeated Martina McMahon 25–19 in the final. The defeated semi-finalists in the Ladies Open were Eilise McRory and Fiona Tully.

On the 60x30 front, the Irish Softball Nationals were hosted by Wexford and Wicklow and took place on July 15/16. Top honours went to Robbie McCarthy and Martina McMahon, who saw off Tommy Hynes and Aishling O'Keeffe respectively in straight games in the Open Singles finals. The hotly contested Men's A Doubles went to Evan Murphy (Limerick) and David Walsh (Cork), who beat Leixlip men Kevin Diggins and Niall O'Connor in the final.

Kyle Jordan/Éanna O'Keeffe won the Boys 17&U title, with Jody Keeling and Hannah Grace emphatic winners of the corresponding girls' grade.

AUGUST

August was dominated by the traditional softball code. The 60x30 Féile returned to the sunny southeast, with Talbot's Inch winning the premier boys grade and Loughmacrory claiming the girls' Division 1 title. Lough' were also in the boys Division 1 decider. The other grades saw Taghmon, Ballydesmond, Kells (Kilkenny) earn success. The Skills winners were Anthony Clifford, Conor Doyle and Ryan Linehan in the boys and Katie Jordan and Shauna Hayes in the girls.

The All-Ireland Senior Softball Singleschampionships for men and women also served off in August. The last eight standing in the Men's Senior Singles were champion Robbie McCarthy, Dominic Lynch (Kerry), Ciaran Neary (Kilkenny), Michael Gregan (Wicklow), Gavin Buggy (Wexford), David Hope (Offaly), Gary McConnell (Meath) and Joe McCann (Mayo).

In the semi-finals, McConnell saw off Buggy (21-20, 21-4) and McCarthy defeated Neary (21-10, 21-6).

In the Ladies Senior Singles, Martina McMahon (Limerick), Fiona Tully (Roscommon), Aoife McCarthy (Westmeath), Pauline Gallagher (Kildare), Aishling O'Keeffe (Cork), Laura Finn (Sligo), Catriona Casey (Cork) and Aoife Holden (Kilkenny) were the quarter-finalists.

At the penultimate stage, McMahon got the better of McCarthy (21-4, 21-12) and Casey beat her own doubles partner O'Keeffe (21-7, 21-2) to set up a very familiar-looking decider between the two current icons of the ladies game.



SEPTEMBER

St Coman's HC in Roscommon was the stage for the biggest day in the softball calendar. In the Men's final, Robbie McCarthy romped to his ninth All-Ireland Senior Softball Singles crown, turning back first-time singles finalist McConnell with a superb display.

The two stars were tied at 9-9 in the first game before McCarthy turned on the style to pull away and win 21-10. His class came to the fore in the second game, which he won 21-3 with a magnificent display.

In the Ladies final, McMahon defeated Casey on a 21-13, 21-18 score line to secure a record-equaling fifth Senior Singles championship in the 'big alley'. In the latest instalment of their amazing rivalry, the Limerick lefty showed her quality with a superb performance.

In the Minor Singles, Carragh Kennedy became the eighth Roscommon player to win the ladies grade when she defeated Leah Minogue of Clare in her (Carragh's) home court. The men's Minor Singles crown also stayed in the west as Sligo's Cormac Finn edged past Kyle Jordan.

The Senior Softball Doubles finals took place on the weekend of September 24/25 in Wexford and, perhaps fittingly, the title was claimed by two local heroes.

Gavin Buggy and Galen Riordan, in their first year playing together, came through tiebreakers against Wicklow (Chris Doyle and Michael Gregan) and Kerry (Dominic Lynch and Jack O'Shea) to advance to the final, where they took on the favorites and two-time defending champions, Gary McConnell and Brian Carroll of Meath.

When the Royals won the first game 21-7, it seemed the home crowd in Castlebridge would be silenced but Buggy and Riordan came roaring back for a 21-14, 11-2 success amidst joyous scenes among the softball-mad Model County supporters.

There was no stopping the peerless Cork pair, Casey and O'Keeffe, in the Ladies Senior Doubles. They beat Limerick in the semi-final and were 21-8, 21-5 victors over Kildare's Mollie Dagg and Pauline Gallagher in the final.

The Lilywhites had edges past Kilkenny (Aoife Holden and Ciara Mahon) in the semi-final.

OCTOBER

The first weekend in October saw the juvenile Softball All-Ireland finals run off in Loughmacrory, Garryhill and Cashel.

Altogether, nine counties were represented in finals. Kilkenny were the most successful, winning six titles; Tyrone and Tipperary landed two apiece and Roscommon, Cork, Laois and Wexford all won one gold medal.

NOVEMBER

On November 12-13, the All-Ireland Wallball Championships were concluded at the Convent of Mercy in Roscommon, with Tyrone's Conor McElduff and Cork's Catriona Casey winning the Senior Singles titles. For both players, it marked a hat-trick of successes in this particular competition.

McElduff was impressive in defeating London's Colm Grace, a Kilkenny native based in the UK, in the semi-final and Tipperary's James Prentice, who had earlier partnered star hurler Jerome Cahill to Intermediate Doubles success in the 60x30 court, in the decider. Prentice defeated Wexford's Joe Devereux in the semi-final. Casey, meanwhile, was pushed hard in the second game of her semi-final against Westmeath's Aoife McCarthy and needed a tiebreaker in the final against local favourite Fiona Tully, who saw off Tyrone's Eilise McCrory at the penultimate stage.

The Men's Minor title went to Armagh's Fiachra Ó Dhúill, who played superbly to defeat Cormac Finn and Eoghan Daly, while Jodie Keeling of Wexford continued her good recent form with victory in the corresponding ladies final against Alanna Coggeran from Kilglass. Meanwhile, the focus turned back to the 'small court' with the first elite ranking event of the season, the ever-popular St Paul's Fonacab Golden Gloves in Belfast, the 34th renewal of the event.


This year, the event attracted a record field of 205 players, with 31 in the open grades. The in-form Robbie McCarthy took the Men's title with a straight games win over Diarmaid Nash. It was no surprise that Casey and McMahon qualified for the ladies final, with the Ballydesmond right-hander winning on this occasion. Also decided during a busy month was the make-up of the Irish juvenile squad for the USHA Junior Nationals in San Francisco. The finals of the trials in Kingscourt saw wins for Carmel Kelleher, Anthony Clifford, Jodie Keeling, Rory Carthy, Leah Minogue and Kyle Jordan.

DECEMBER

The All-Ireland Senior inter-club title went back to Meath when Kells defeated Carrickmore 75-58 to win the title for the fifth time and first since 2017. The Kells team was Gary McConnell, Michael Sheridan, Robert Fox, Tom Sheridan and Daniel Farrelly.

Friary/Abbeyside from Waterford beat Breacach in the Junior final, with Cork's Liscarroll defeating Bofield (Mayo) to claim the Junior B championship. The year was rounded off in style as the Irish squad dominated the USHA Junior Nationals in San Francisco.

The six-strong team, coached by Aengus Cunningham and Eilise McCrory, proved far too strong for the Americans and Canadians. The Irish players won all four-wall grades in singles and doubles, with Galway's Caleb Donnellan, who was not a member of the official team, also adding the 15&U 'big ball' singles title.

REPORT FROM THE HEAD OF HANDBALL

CONGRESS 2023

I would like to begin by thanking my predecessor Tom Moloney who did a fantastic job as interim Head of Handball. I would also like to thank Shane Flanagan and Tom Ryan for all their support since I started in the role last October. A special mention to the outgoing Uachtarán Dessie Keegan and the incoming Uachtarán Conor McDonnell, both of whom have been unbelievably giving of their time and knowledge and have helped me at every juncture.

I would also like to thank both Darragh Daly and Pauric Dowdall who after many years of service have recently left the GAA Handball office. On behalf of GAA Handball, I would like to take this opportunity to wish them both the best of luck in their future endeavors.

As a recent appointee to the role of Head of Handball, I wanted to begin by visiting the four provincial councils, to meet with and speak to our membership about the various elements which make up the GAA Handball and also about a pathway forward, one which will help to grow and develop this fantastic sport. These meetings were not only extremely helpful from a fact finding perspective, they, were also incredibly enjoyable. The feedback and level of engagement I received during these visits was highly encouraging. While GAA Handball, like all other sports faces various challenges, the passion, drive, intellect and commitment I have witnessed from the volunteers I have met, fills me with positivity about the future. I would sincerely like to thank the four provincial councils and county boards, along with the wider GAA Handball membership for the welcome I have received since commencing in the role.

Our volunteers, clubs and committees are the heart and soul of the organisation and should be commended for their work within the sport, and within their wider communities. GAA Handball is exceptionally lucky to have such high quality volunteers within its ranks. The game of Handball itself also has so many positive components, such as very few barriers to entry, well defined rules, it is a non-contact sport, its exceptionally fun to play, it is a genuine cradle to the grave sport, and it continues to grow internationally. We need to embrace these positive elements and to use them as the platform to reinvigorate and redevelop the sport.

One of the things that has struck me most from the feedback I have received from members is the frustration that appears to exist within the sport towards how it has developed over the last number of years. For all the positives that exist the sport does not appear to be reaching the wider public and there appears to be very little growth in the numbers of people involved in the sport. This is something that we as an organisation must address holistically. Regardless of whether we are paid administrators or volunteers, we are all custodians for the sport, and our aim should always be to build upon and improve the structures of the game for the next generation of handballers.

We are a minority sport whose membership and playing numbers pale in comparison to many other sports, which only furthers the need for us all to work together for the betterment of the sport and to secure its future.

We live in a time when children and adults have an abundance of options when it comes to choosing

what past times, hobbies and sports they will pursue. This in turn creates an ultra-competitive space when it comes to attracting new members and securing additional funding. The position we find ourselves in is not a unique one, with many other sports having gone through similar journeys. We need to look towards other sports who have developed, grown and rejuvenated their games, and apply the same best practice strategies and standards within GAA Handball. This body of work will no doubt require support, both internally and externally. In order to secure this support, we must embrace the rules and structures of the GAA while utilizing the fantastic resources and knowledge base that exists throughout our parent body. Further in order to access additional funding, we must strive to meet the governance requirements as set out by our external funders.

All state funded sporting bodies are now required by Sport Ireland to be compliant with the Governance Code for Sport. The journey towards good governance places extra administrational duties and expectations on all sporting bodies, however, this is a journey we must take if we are to continue to draw down on state funding. Since starting in the role I have been working very closely with Sport Ireland and with staff within the GAA, to help GAA Handball meet the required standards to become code compliant. I am delighted to announce that Sport Ireland will be providing us with the services of Senan Turnbull of the Carmichael Centre, who is an expert in sporting governance, to assist us in this journey. Sport Ireland have kindly agreed to provide GAA Handball with Senan's services for the next six months, free of charge.

Further we have secured a 4% increase on the two previous years (2020 & 2021) on our Core Grant funding received from Sport Ireland bring the amount up to €120,000. This is in addition to the €75,000 Sports Energy Support Scheme (SESS) Funding secured to help our clubs with the increase in energy costs and also the €80,000 Recovery Grant & Return to Sport Funding which was secured to help NGB's grow their membership and club network. So far, we have been successful in securing a total of €275,000 of Sport Ireland funding with the promise of access to additional funding in line with us meeting our governance requirements.

I believe GAA Handball is at a very exciting point in its history. The state-of-the-art GAA Handball Centre in Croke Park is a fantastic facility and one every member should be proud of. While there have been a number of issues, as is common with all new builds, the centre gives handball a strong base going forward, and I think all who attended the I-Wall European event in December will agree that there is huge potential and promise within the centre. GAA Handball now being under the coaching and games development department

opens up additional opportunities that were not previously there for Handball.

The upcoming introduction of our regional development officers will create a better professional structure and platform for growth and development.

In closing, thank you all for being so welcoming since I took up the role of Head of Handball and to wish you and your clubs the very best for the new season ahead.

OUTGOING UACHTARÁN'S ADDRESS

First and foremost, I wish to welcome you all here to Congress 2023. This is a very important Congress as we have crucial motions to debate and vote on today, however we have our incoming Uachtarán, Conor Mc Donnell, taking over from myself today. I wish Conor all the best in the role, and I look forward to seeing handball develop under his leadership over the next 3 years.

Within a month of starting the role in February 2020, the Irish Government put Ireland in lockdown. I feel it's important to acknowledge at this point that Covid had a devastating impact on all manners of life. It would take the guts of 2 years to get back to where we were in terms of activity pre-covid. The world is still trying to recover from this devastation. However, when we were legally allowed, Handball was one of the first indoor sports to return to play. I wish to thank all of volunteer members, and our professional staff, for the work that they all done to get courts up and down the country open for players and officials during the easing of restrictions. This was no easy task due to the safety requirements placed on everyone.

Even though play had stopped on the courts, we were busy off the courts trying to build a better future structurally for the game. Some of the key areas that have been delivered during my term are as follows:

- · Launch of Strategic Plan
- Integration of GAA Handball into the GAA under the department of Coaching and Games Development
- A more modern CLAR that aims to increase participation and retention of players and officials
- Introduction of a Ladies committee that designed a new trial She's Ace championship
- · Recommendation of Constitutional changes and playing rule changes to modernise our sport
- Funding secured for more regional development officers we will go from 5 staff pre covid to 6 staff – this is a result of an office review during 2022. The result will be more localised support
- Ireland competed again at the USHA juniors in San Francisco. This international trip stopped many years ago, however we secured funding to send a team again
- Ireland competed in the FIPV world Frontball championships 33 countries competed
- · Ireland hosted its first ever Elite WallBall event in our new National Centre
- The launch of the Youth Expo was a major success for our juveniles
- The summer series brought handball back outdoors and revitalised many unused outdoor courts and tournaments were held
- Grants were secured to support clubs to "bounce-back" from Covid many clubs got once off grants to offset costs
- Juvenile recruitment project resulted in almost 1500 new juveniles taking up handball. This project also brought new energy back into near 50 clubs that applied for funding
- Established international links with the FIPV and the CIJB these are sister organisations that play a slightly different type of handball to ourselves re WallBall
- The introduction of Clubforce and Foireann which will streamline our entries and registrations

At this point, I would like to thank the many people who made all of the above possible. From our professional staff, to the volunteers, none of the things we have done together would have been possible if it wasn't for your determination and commitment to our sport.

It is no secret that GAA Handball, and indeed the GAA, experienced significant staff turmoil as a result of Covid. It has been a difficult time for our professional staff, and I would like to thank John Kelly, Darragh Daly, Austin Mc Kenna, Pauric Dowdall and Bridget Doheny for the services that they provided to handball, and I wish them well into the future.

To Tom Moloney who came into GAA Handball to carry out a full review of our structures, I wish to thank you from the bottom of my heart for your sincere efforts in putting in place a structure that will lead to significant growth of our game going into the future. REPORT FROM JUVENILE TRIP TO US JUNIOR NATIONALS IN SAN FRANCISCO

(23/12/2022 - 31/12/2022)

The team was picked after trials held in the Kingscourt complex over the weekend of 19/20 November 2022. The overall standard in the trials was very high and a number of the eventual winners had to come through some very tough tests of character in order to qualify.

The team left Dublin Airport on 23 December 2022. Before leaving each member of the team was presented with two complimentary pairs of Kill Shot handball gloves by Paul Fitzpatrick and Michael Finnegan. Paul also conducted a few short interviews and the resulting article appeared in The Irish Independent on 24 December.

The direct flight to San Francisco Airport took over eleven hours. The fact that the flight was direct worked in our favour, as the huge winter storms in the eastern half of the US would almost certainly have impacted on our flights if we had a stopover.

We stayed in the 'Double Tree by Hilton Hotel Pleasanton at the Club' which was directly next door to the competition venue. The hotel was top class, with spacious, clean rooms and friendly staff. There was an issue the first morning with regard to the inclusion of breakfast, but David Britton dealt with the situation quickly and efficiently. Even with the eight-hour time difference and holiday season, right throughout the trip David was always available for consultation and very helpful.

As a group we did some sightseeing over the next few days, taking in such sights as Alcatraz Prison, the Golden Gate Bridge, Chinatown, and Lombard Street. We even got to play some handball in the old one wall courts in the recreation yard of Alcatraz. These trips were enjoyable and seemed to foster a good team spirit amongst the players.

The handball started on 27 December in the beautiful Bay Club Pleasanton sporting complex. There were eight handball courts in total, two show courts with glass backwalls and six courts with no glass where viewing was from above.

On the first day, there was very heavy rainfall throughout the day, and this resulted in a lot of condensation on the walls of all courts. This problem was eventually sorted by the use of fans and dehumidifiers which were used for the remainder of the competition.

The Girls 15&under was a round-robin affair and Cork's highly skilled Carmel Kelleher dominated the competition winning all three matches and only being pushed in the second game of her match with Kilkenny's Katie Jordan, who was an independent entrant.

The Boys 15&under was a straight knockout competition and before the final it looked like Anthony Clifford could have a tough match against Denver's Elisio Guttierez, but the Kilkenny youngster showed very mature tactical awareness and shot selection to win comfortably. His father Timmy won the same title back in the 1990s and was there to witness the historic occasion.

The Girls 17&under was another round-robin and Wexford's hard-hitting Jodie Keeling had very few problems in winning both her matches against American opposition.

The Boys 17&under was the most eagerly awaited final of all, as both Roscommon's Rory Carthy and Mexico's Andres Cordova (younger brother of Luis and Daniel) looked very impressive in the runup. However, Rory started fast and never took his foot off the pedal, killing repeatedly on his way to a surprisingly wide win.

Due to the low entry numbers in the Girls 19&under grade, all three female members of the Ireland team competed along with a number of others from the lower ages in a straight knockout format. Clare's strong Leah Minogue won out after a tough encounter with Jodie Keeling, who had a tight win over Carmel Kelleher in their semi-final.

Over the four days of competition, the undoubted star of the show was Kilkenny's Kyle Jordan. He was simply on another level to every other competitor there and won out the 19&under grade with the minimum of fuss.

Kyle teamed up with California's David Sanchez to win the 19&under doubles title.

Leah and Jodie joined together to win the 19&under doubles.

Rory and Anthony won out the 17&under doubles.

Caleb Donnellan from Galway, who entered independently, won the 15&under Big Ball singles.



GENERAL OBSERVATIONS

The overall feedback on the trip from the team, management and parents who travelled was unanimously positive. For teenagers, the lure of going to America cannot be overestimated. While coming under pressure from other more popular sports, the incentive to continue playing handball is strengthened by a potential trip to the States.

By normal handball standards the publicity this trip got at home was huge. Every player on the team reported how, with the help of social media and the resultant instant updates, they were getting constant messages of encouragement – and not just from family and friends. The streaming of the matches, which was very clear despite only being broadcast from a mobile phone, meant people could watch the matches 'live' on the other side of the world at a time of the year when there is very little competition from other sports. A number of videos were posted from the players' hometowns where virtually all the patrons in various pubs were glued to their phones watching handball.

As a minority sport handball needs every ounce of publicity it can get, and this trip got massive attention.

Finally, it would be remiss of us not to mention the players. Not only were they superb handballers, but they were an exceptionally nice group of kids, who behaved impeccably throughout. Each one of them is a credit to their families and clubs.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

In our opinion, Liathróid Láimhe CLG na hÉireann's financial statements for the year ended 30 September 2022 have been properly prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with the basis of preparation and accounting policies in note 3 to the financial statements.

We have audited the financial statements, which comprise:

- the balance sheet as at 30 September 2022;

- the notes to the financial statements, which include a description of the significant accounting policies.

Basis for opinion

Conclusions relating to going concern

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1 General information

These financial statements comprising the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings and the Balance Sheet and the related notes constitute the individual financial statements of Liathróid Láimhe CLG na hÉireann for the financial year ended 30 September 2022.

Liathróid Láimhe CLG na hÉireann is an unincorporated association.

Liathróid Láimhe CLG na hÉireann is deemed to be a public benefit entity (PBE) in accordance with FRS 102.

Statement of compliance

The entity financial statements comply with Financial Reporting Standard 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" (FRS 102).

Currency

The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the Council.

2 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for certain assets and liabilities that are measured at fair values as explained in the accounting policies below. The financial statements comprise the activity of the Liathróid Láimhe CLG na hÉireann established by the Central Council of Cumann Lúthchleas Gael for the preservation and promotion of the national game of handball and have been prepared in accordance with FRS 102 with the exception of the exclusion of certain income, expenses, assets and liabilities which relate to the Central Council of Cumann Lúthchleas Gael. Consolidated financial statements of the Central Council of Cumann Lúthchleas Gael, which include all activities and entities that are controlled by the Central Council are prepared and available in the GAA Annual Report and on the Association's website.

The preparation of financial statements requires the use of certain key assumptions concerning the future, and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the financial period. It also requires the management to exercise judgement in the process of applying the fund's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or areas where assumptions and estimates have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are disclosed in below.

The accounting period is for the year to 30 September 2022. The comparative period is for 11 months to 30 September 2021.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis and in accordance with the accounting policies set out herein.

Going concern

Management consider that it is appropriate for the financial statements to be prepared on the going concern basis as the measures taken to improve operating performance together with the on-going support of the Cumann Lúthcleas Gael will ensure the continued operational activity of the Liathróid Láimhe CLG na hÉireann for the foreseeable future.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

3 Accounting policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the financial statements.

Income

Grant income is recognised when performance related conditions are achieved.

Other income is recognised on an accruals basis and recognised in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings in line with underlying agreements.

Property, plant and equipment

All property, plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost. This includes legal fees, stamp duty and other non-refundable purchase taxes, and also any costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management, which can include the costs of site preparation, initial delivery and handling, installation and assembly, and testing of functionality.

Finance costs incurred during the construction period of property, plant and equipment that are directly attributable to the construction of those assets are capitalised as part of the cost of those assets.

Depreciation is provided on all property, plant and equipment, other than land, at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value, of each asset systematically over its expected useful life, on a straight line basis, as follows:

Office equipment 20% Straight line Computer equipment 33% Straight line

Inventory

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is based on normal levels of cost and activity and comprises cost of purchase and, where appropriate, cost of conversion to current condition and location.

Net realisable value comprises the actual or estimated selling price less all further costs to completion and all costs to be incurred in selling.

Financial Instruments

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash consists of cash on hand and demand deposits. Cash equivalents consist of short term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash that are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Other financial assets

Other financial assets including receivables, are initially measured at the undiscounted amount of cash receivable from that individual or entity, which is normally the invoice price, and are subsequently measured at amortised cost less impairment, where there is objective evidence of an impairment.

Other financial liabilities

Payables are measured at invoice price, unless payment is deferred beyond normal trading terms or is financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate. In this case the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, and the financial liability is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Management consider the accounting estimates and assumptions below to be its critical accounting estimates and judgements:

4 Sport Ireland Grants

Sport Ireland - Core Funding Grant of €115,000

This grant contributes towards the annual general administration costs incurred by the Association. The grant covers the calendar year ending on 31 December 2022. €86,250 of the grant is included in the Statement of Income and Retained Earnings for the financial year ended 30 September 2022 with €28,750 deferred to the financial year 30 September 2023 as shown in Schedule 1. The Sport Ireland grant is sponsored by the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media.

Sport Ireland - Dormant Account Funding Grant of €44,000

This grant contributed towards expenditure incurred by the Association in increasing participation in the Sport. Sport Ireland - Women in Sport Grant Funding of €35,000
